#### BUSINESS OF A DAY AT HARRISBURG

Act to Prevent Fraud in Cheese-Making Is Killed.

AMENDMENT TO BAKER BALLOT BILL

The Act Relating to Criminal Libel Made a Special Order for Final Game and Fish Bill Concurred in. Gould Bill Passed Finally.

Harrisburg, Pa., May 26 .- In the senate this morning Mr. Grady introduced a resolution instructing the chief clerk to have printed 5,000 copies of the report of the Andrews senatorial investigation committee. A concurrent resolution to the same effect passed both branches of the legislature, but it was vetoed by the governor. The esolution passed by a viva voce vote. It does not have to be sent to the gov-

The act to provide for the inspection of boilers and the licensing of en-giners went through on final passage, while the act to prevent fraud and deception in the manufacture and sale of cheese was killed. The Stewart game and fish bill was concurred in, and the bill amending the Baker ballot bill, which is amendatory act among other things, provides for employing of a patent tube to hold the ballot, passed finally.

When the Hamilton road bill came up on second reading Mr. Brown, of Westmoreland, moved to increase the appropriation from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000. The bill as it came from the house, provided for the expenditure of this latter sum. The amendment was defeated by a vote of 21 to 13, and the bill passed second reading.

The act relating to criminal libel was made a special order on final passage for Tuesday. The senate then adjourned until Monday evening.
