JURORS DID NOT WANT TO SERVE

Coroner Longstreet Was Not Long in
Showing Them Their Duty.

'SQUIRE GYLYNN DID NOT LIKE IT
He Empaneled a Jury Tuesday
Evening After the Unknown Hun-
garian Was Taken from the Lacka-
wanna River at Simpson, but Also
Served on the Jury Sworn by the
Coroner - He Showed a Good
Deal of Feeling.

Coroner S. P. Longstreet found it
necessary yesterday to command a
number of men to act as jurors in an
inquest at Simpson, a few miles north
of Carbondale. The case was that of
the Hungarian who fell from a bridge
crossing the Lackawanna at Simpson
Tuesday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock and
was at first reported to be drowned.

THE SKULL FRACTURED.
Coroner Longstreet began his post-
mortem examination and near the end
of it Mr. Glynn, "J. P.," entered the
room. The examination showed that
the dead man's skull had been cracked
on the left side from the middle line
to the ear.

THE MEN SERVED.
After this the men responded with
alacrity and things went smoothly
until Glynn who was also compelled
to serve as a juror made an insulting
remark. Then a recess was taken for
a few minutes while the coroner told
Mr. Glynn some things in a straight
from the shoulder fashion.
