EMBRACE COST HIM \$15.

Hyde Park Hugs Come High, as Benjamin Allgood Found to His Great Grief.

Alderman Davis last evening disposed of the case of Benjamin Allgood, of Price street, charged with having hugged Mrs. Louise Harmer, of Oxford street. Ex-Judge Stanton appeared for the alleged "hugger" and ex-Alderman DeLong for the "huggee." Mrs. Harmer swore positively that she had been hugged as described in The Tribune and that Allgood did the hugging.

Allgood denied the charge point blank, put in character evidence and tried to establish an alibi. The alibi was believed by Harmer's story and sentenced Allgood to a \$15 fine or thirty days in jail. When Judge Stanton realized that the probabilities were that his client would be adjudged guilty he made an effort in an indirect way to have the case sent to court as an attempted criminal assault.

The counsel for the prosecution protested against this, knowing full well that such a serious charge would hardly be supported by the evidence when the matter was rushed through the grand jury mill, and rather than run the risk of having Allgood acquitted through any such loop-hole, he pressed for summary conviction on the charge of disorderly conduct.

The alderman found that disorderly conduct was the appropriate characterization of the crime and disorderly conduct it was.
