

COUNTERFEITED DOLLARS.

Treasury Department Detective Arrests Two Men.

Watertown, May 27 .- An important arrest was made at Gouverneur, St. Lawrence county, when Secret Service Detective Frank Esquirill, of New York, placed under lock and key two counterfeiters. For some time past counterfeit silver dollars have been in circulation in Gouverneur and neighboring places. The matter was report-ed to the treasury department at Washington, and Detective Esquirill was sent to investigate.

Today he arrested Henry Mashaw Mashaw resisted, but was overpowered and locked up. He made a partial confession as to the acts of the counterfeiters. He said that he and others had passed the coins, which had been made by George Flint, who resides with a common-law wife in Gouver-neur, Flint was also arrested. The officers made a thorough search of the premises of the prisoners, and found proof of the destroying of the moulds in which the coins were made. Other arrests will follow. The prisoners will be held for the United States court.


