WAS A VERY BUSY DAY FOR POLICE

They Rounded Up Sixteen Prisoners in the City Saturday.

FIVE OF THEM WERE PICKPOCKETS

Three Were Taken Into Custody at the Circus Grounds and Two on Washington Avenue—Former Were Asked to Furnish Bail—Manner in Which the Various Cases Were Disposed of by Alderman Fuller Yesterday Morning.

Chief Robbing and his subordinates were kept very busy Saturday. The circus and the Memorial day parade brought thousands to the city and with the former came a drove of pick-pockets and others who are wont to get into trouble with the police because of the nature of their occupations. During the day 16 arrests were made by the officers. Both parades were handled in a most satisfactory manner.

OFFERED A BRIBE. "There's \$36 here," announced Patrolman Day. "That's all right," said the prisoner, "I was going to give you that if you released us."

THEY WERE NOT RELEASED, HOWEVER, and were taken before Alderman Fuller yesterday morning. Each was held in \$500 bail to appear at court. The three men were given an opportunity to purchase their freedom on payment of a fine of \$15 each. They refuse to do so and consequently they were taken to the county jail yesterday afternoon.
