

Maguire sacrificed and the two runners got each a base. Massey came in on Gunsen's slow grounder to Od-well which retired Gunson at first. Harper fouled out to Diggins.

The Earons made close attempts to win out in the eighth and ninth. With two out in the eighth Goeckel hit to center for a base and O'Brien muffed Betts' fly after a long run back of second. Goeckel went to third on the errer but Betts was forced by Odwell. In the ninth Mills got a walk and reached second on Diggins' out from Gunson to Massey on a dropped third strike. Smith flew out to O'Brien. Gonding was sent to bat in place of Powell and drew four balls which put two runners on the circuit. L. Smith was batted in place of Sheehan but the best he could do was to drive a grounder at Harper which the latter handled successfully and fielded the runner out at first.

MINERS' FIELDING.

It was Gunson's first game for over three weeks, since his thumb was sprained by a foul tip in one of the games with Providence. He backed well for Harper and flagged Udwell, the first runner who tried to purloin secord, so neatly in the second inning that no further attempts were made in that direction. The Miners' three errors cost nothing. Beard's was on a muffed fly in short left-center, Massey fumbled a slow grounder and O'Brien muffed a ity after he had made a hard run for i toward second. Nearly all the infield work fell on Beard who accepted nine of his ten chances.

Odwell and Mills were kept busy in the Baron infield. They accepted 17 chances between them. The former's playing was particularly good. Neither team had much opportunity for star individual plays.


