FARR LABOR BILL PASSES HOUSES

The Measure Goes Through by Vote of 113 to 61.

AMENDMENTS TO THE LIBEL BILL

House Elections Committee Decides in Favor of Adam Shiffer in the Northampton County Contest.

Harrisburg, June 1.—After being in session about three hours today, the senate adjourned until Monday evening.
