GOVERNOR SIGNS THE WEILER BILL

A Measure Endorsed by the Labor Organizations.

MR. HEIDELBAUGH TURNED DOWN

He Is Refused a Special Order for His Sunday Foot Ball, Base Ball and Golf Restricting Bill--The Uniform Steam Passenger Rate Scheme Is Again Blocked in the Committee.

Harrisburg, Pa., June 4.--The house refused this morning by a vote of 49 to 49 to recommit to the municipal corporations committee the Becker bill relating to the confirmation of appointments of the mayor of Philadelphia.

Heidelbaugh, of Lancaster, was refused a special order for his bill to prohibit the playing of foot ball, base ball and golf on Sunday.

A special order was granted on motion of Mr. Bentley, of Erie, for a bill to cover into counties money uncollected for after ten years for the use of boroughs, townships and cities.

Mr. Hammond, of Westmoreland, was refused a special order for senate bill empowering boroughs and town councils to annex adjacent lots on petition of the property owners.

Governor Hastings this afternoon signed the Weiler bill to protect the employes of corporations in their right to belong to labor organizations.

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Mr. Hastings also signed the measure which would strip improvements in cities of the second class.

GOVERNOR'S VETOS.

Judge Hanna's Ruling on the Direct Inheritance Tax Law.

Philadelphia, June 4.--President Judge Hanna, of the Orphans' court, this afternoon in adjudicating the estate of George Blight, deceased, decided that the new direct inheritance tax law is unconstitutional. The law was recently passed by the legislature as a revenue measure and was expected to add between \$600,000 and \$1,000,000 annually to the revenues of the state.
