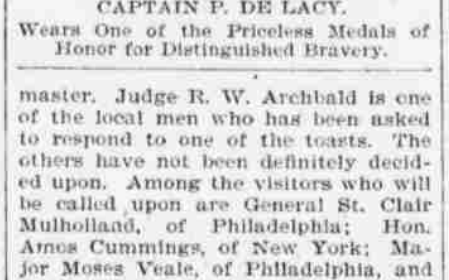
HOTEL JERMYN IS DECIDED UPON
