WILL NOT ASSIST THE LEGISLATURE

Governor Hastings Refuses to Name Subjects for Taxation.

AN ACTION WITHOUT PRECEDENT

Governor Has Never Before Been Called Upon to Take Part in Legislation—He Would Gladly Approve Bills Cutting Down Salaries of State Officials.

Harrisburg, Pa., June 7.—Governor Hastings sent to the senate without his approval the concurrent resolution requesting him to state what new subjects of taxation he has to recommend to the general assembly to increase the revenues.

I am not aware that at any time in the past the executive has been called upon by the general assembly to take part in legislation, and the resolution under consideration has therefore, neither precedent nor authority of law upon which to stand.

Your honorable bodies were furnished by me more than five months ago with a detailed estimate of the probable revenues during the next two fiscal years and were advised at the same time that appropriations would not be approved in excess of the estimates so made unless additional revenues were provided.

BELIEVES IN RETRENCHMENT.

At this time, when almost all industries are suffering, when trade is stagnant and when willing labor can not find employment, economy in the expenditure of public moneys should control the general assembly, in its appropriations and will certainly command the approval of all reasonable men.

When the individual citizen finds it necessary to exercise the most rigid economy in order to support himself and his family it is certainly not surprising that the general assembly should do the same.

THOUGHT TO MAKE THE HOUSE WORK

Harrisburg, Pa., June 7.—In the senate this evening Mr. Meredith introduced a concurrent resolution providing for the adjournment of the legislature sine die on July 1. The resolution was agreed to.

The senate then adjourned until tomorrow morning. The report of the committee appointed to inquire into the condition of the miners in the bituminous coal regions was read and adopted and a concurrent resolution was agreed to, providing for the printing of six thousand copies of the same.

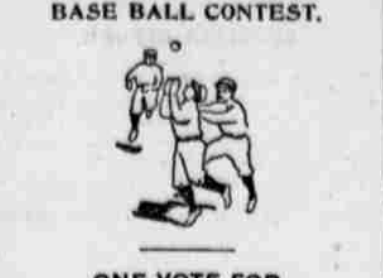
FOR STATE SUPPLIES.
