NO EXCUSES NOW.

Miners Lost at Rochester Because They Were Outplayed in All Departments.

Y., June 11--A combination of hits by Rochester, errors by Ollie Beard and base on balls by Morse in the first inning allowed Rochester to score five runs and win the game with Scranton today and there. In the ninth just to put the chance of being defeated a little further away the Brownies ran in a couple more scores but it would have been a victory had the tally remained the same that it was in the end of the first inning for Rochester.

Scranton never got a real show at the game although the feeling has been prevalent here that the Miners are the generous, and that is why the cranks kept in their places even until the last man was out. Yerrick was very mysterious to them and pitched a rattling good game.

FIVE TO ROCHESTER.

The scoring began with Frank Shannon, who singled and went to third on Lynch's search hit. The ball rolled towards first and Morse picked it up and sent it to Ollie to stop Frank, but Ollie allowed it to pass through his hands, and Lynch got to second. Shearon got four balls and Dooley advanced each a base and scored Kid Shannon on a single. Another base on balls forced Lynch in. Richter flew out and Ollie missed Mulvey's hit on which Shearon scored and Dooley was caught at the plate by an assist from Eagan to Gunson. Frary's three-bagger scored Dan Shannon.

After that inning Rochester could do nothing with Morse until the ninth, when Dooley was hit, went to second while Dan was going out from Beard to Massey and scored on Richter's right field single. SCRANTON HAS A WORLD'S CHAMPION

Jerome Keogh Brings Home the Medal for Pool Playing.

DEFEATED GRANT EBY WITH EASE

In a Three Nights' Contest at Conventions Pool in Proctor's Pleasure Palace, New York, the Scranton Boy Defeated the Champion and Gathers in a \$175 Gold Medal and \$350 in Cash--Clearwater to Play Here Within Forty Days.

Jerome R. Keogh returned yesterday from New York, bearing with him the world's championship at pool, a medal representing the same which is valued at \$175, and \$350 of good money that he didn't have when he left here Sunday night.

All this came of his defeating Grant H. Ahy, of Springfield, Ohio, who until Wednesday night held the pool championship. Eby got it by defeating Stewart, who secured by forfeit from Chey the Cuban, who won it from Clearwater, who came out first in the world's championship tournament held in Kuntze's parlors, Syracuse, in 1895.

It was like a family reunion when the teams got together. Frank Boyd was behind the bat for Scranton, Ollie Beard was in center field and "Sandy" Griffin and Jim Daly were both in uniform on the bench. All of these gentlemen have exercised their talents in the interests of Rochester teams at one time or another in the past and there were many long range exchanges of greeting and of expressions of mutual regard between them and their admirers of former years.
