WARRANTS FOR OLEO HANDLERS

Issued at the Instance of Special Agent James Terry. SERVED BY CONSTABLE COLES

Accused Men Will Have a Hearing This Morning at 9 O'clock Before Alderman Howe--An Analyst of the Oleo Was Made by Albert H. Welles, Professor of Chemistry at the Scranton High School.

According to the statements of James Terry, special agent of the department of agriculture, Scrantonians or residents nearby have, during the past few weeks, consumed unknowingly some forty-five hundred pounds, and possibly much more, of the unpopular concoction of tallow fat and carrot juice, which masquerades for butter under the name of oleomargarine.
