JERMYN.

The following law has recently been passed providing a method of procedure for violation of law and through ordinances, and for the collections of the fines and penalties imposed for said violations:

Section 1.—Be it enacted, etc., that the policemen and constables of the several boroughs of this commonwealth, in addition to the powers already conferred upon them, shall and may, without warrant and upon view, arrest and commit for hearing any and all persons guilty of a breach of the peace, vagrancy, or disorderly conduct, or drunkenness, or may be engaged in the commission of any unlawful act, tending to imperil the personal security or endanger the property of the citizens, or violating any ordinance of said violation of which a fine or penalty is imposed.

Any person or persons arrested, with or without warrant, shall be entitled to a trial and to give bail for his or her appearance, according to the practice in summary convictions in criminal cases.

Section 3.—Any person arrested for the violation of a borough ordinance may be committed to the borough lockup pending a hearing or trial, but in case there is no suitable lockup or place in which to detain prisoners the person arrested may be committed to the county jail. Upon judgment against any person by summary conviction, or by proceedings by summons on default of payment of fines or penalty imposed by said judgment and the costs, the defendant shall be sentenced and committed to the borough lockup for a period not exceeding five days, or to the county jail for a period not exceeding thirty days.
