FULL INQUIRY ON THE TREATY

The Hawaiian Affair Referred to a Committee of the Senate.

NO ACTION THIS SESSION

All Complications Will Be Carefully Considered.

The Work of Considering the International Bearings of Annexation Will Probably Prevent Action on the Subject at This Session--Senate Committee Majority Favors the Treaty--A Growl from the British Lion.

Washington, June 23.--The Hawaiian annexation treaty formed the principal topic of consideration by the senate committee on foreign relations at its brief session today.

The sub-committee will consider all the complications likely to grow out of annexation, including those referring to the trade relations of the islands.

Comparatively little was said bearing upon the merits of the treaty at the sub-committee's meeting.

ENGLAND AND HAWAII.

London, June 23.--In the house of commons tomorrow Ernest William Reckett, conservative member of the Whitty division of the North Riding of Yorkshire, will question the parliamentary secretary for the foreign office, George N. Curzon, as to whether the government is aware that "Queen Liliuokalani has been deposed by a small body of Americans, who, without right or title, have assumed sovereignty over Hawaii, and now, to save themselves from the wrath of the people, have requested the American government to annex Hawaii, and whether Great Britain proposes to allow this most important coaling station to pass into the hands of the United States without protest."

WRONGFULLY DISMISSED.

Washington, June 23.--Assistant Secretary Vanderlip returned today from Philadelphia, where he went last Monday to investigate the claims to reinstatement of a number of old soldiers who were dismissed from the government mint in 1864 for alleged partisan reasons.

BIG NAMES FILCHED.

PROGRESS ON TARIFF.

The Senate Completes the Paragraph of the Wool Schedule. Washington, June 23.--After a contest lasting throughout today, the senate completed the paragraphs of the wool schedule relating to raw wool and advanced into the features relating to manufactured woolen goods.

At one point, Mr. Hoar diverted the discussion by reference to William J. Bryan's opposition to the tariff. This brought Senators Mantle and Allen and Stewart to the defense of Mr. Bryan.
