CORNELL VICTORIOUS.

Wins the Boat Race at Poughkeepsie, Columbia, Second; Pennsylvania, Third.

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., June 30--The college freshmen race of the Cornell, Columbia and Pennsylvania this morning was one of the most remarkable on record. The crews were wonderfully evenly matched. Cornell won the race only three-fourths of a length ahead of Columbia and Pennsylvania was only one-third of a length behind Columbia. The boats were so close together and all of the crews were rowing so well that had further distance been obliged to have been between the positions might have changed. Cornell won earned her victory by steady even work from start to finish. Both the other crews, however, did splendidly. Not a man in any boat was distressed at the finish.

Pennsylvania took a slight lead in the first eighth of a mile with Columbia second. Then Cornell gradually crept up but the lead she obtained was slight. So it continued through the race. At the mile and a half, she had a lead of a quarter of a length ahead of Columbia. Columbia then gradually gained and passed Pennsylvania but Cornell could not be reached and the line was crossed as stated with Cornell a winner by three quarters of a length. Columbia second only a third of a boat length ahead of Pennsylvania. All the men were in good condition. It was certainly a grand race. Cornell's official time was 9:21 1-5.
