

STEWART SENT TO THE COUNTY JAIL

He is the Light-Fingered Young Man Who Has a Fondness for Diamonds.

WAS SHOWING KILLEN A TRICK

The Latter Is From Olyphant and Stewart Was Generously Giving Him the Benefit of His Superior Knowledge with Reference to the Best Method of Removing Diamonds—Lesson Ended in a Very Disastrous Manner for Stewart.

Robert Stewart, the young man who took ex-Sheriff Robinson's diamond pin and was turned over to Chief of Police Robling in the Elk cafe on Thursday night, was held under \$500 bail by Mayor Bailey yesterday morning.

He now confesses that there was an unspoken scene to the little episode in the cafe, a scene behind the scenes, so to speak. It took place in Ed. Horn's Franklin avenue saloon and happened just a few minutes previous to the arrest of Stewart.

Stewart and a number of others of his kind were giving each other pointers in the business. It was a session dear to the heart of a crack and attracted a lot of talent.

At the hearing yesterday Stewart pleaded guilty to the charge. He, however, had been apprised of the extreme cleverness of the trick and Stewart was sent up. Killeen was discharged because there was no direct evidence against him.

Central Pennsylvania Telephone Company Can Put Wires Under Ground.

PROVISIONS OF THE ORDINANCE

Before Exercising Any of the Privileges Granted, the Company Must File a Bond in the Sum of \$5,000 to Protect the City in Case the Streets Are Not Properly Repaired After Being Torn Up to Lay Wires.

Mayor Bailey yesterday signed the ordinance "granting the Central Pennsylvania Telephone and Supply company permission to construct, operate and maintain underground conduits, ducts, mains or pipes, with the necessary manholes, poles and other appliances, for the purpose of maintaining and placing thereon their wires and cables and appurtenances thereto, and to connect such wires and cables, when so placed, with the necessary overhead wires to subscribers, streets and other points, where the same may be desired, in such manner and by such means as may be adapted to the locality. Property or conduits shall not be disturbed, except by consent of the owner or owners of the same."

Section 1.—Be it ordained by the select and common councils of the city of Scranton, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, That the corporation known as the Central Pennsylvania Telephone and Supply company, organized under the laws of the state of Pennsylvania, be and it is hereby permitted to construct, lay, operate and maintain under and over the surface of the streets, conduits, ducts, mains or pipes, with the necessary manholes, poles and other appliances, for the purpose of maintaining and placing thereon their wires and cables and appurtenances thereto, and to connect such wires and cables, when so placed, with the necessary overhead wires to subscribers, streets and other points, where the same may be desired, in such manner and by such means as may be adapted to the locality. Property or conduits shall not be disturbed, except by consent of the owner or owners of the same.

MUST FILE A BOND. Sec. 2.—Before exercising any of the privileges granted hereby, said company shall file with the city clerk a bond in the sum of \$5,000, with sufficient surety to protect the city in case the streets are not properly repaired after being torn up to lay wires.

Sec. 3.—Before exercising any of the privileges granted hereby, said company shall submit to the city engineer a plan showing the location and character of the proposed work, and all such work when laid shall have been approved by the city engineer, shall be performed under the supervision and to the satisfaction of the city engineer.

Sec. 4.—Said company shall not at any time excavate or encumber more of any street, court or place, than shall be necessary to perform the work of laying and erecting its conduits, ducts, mains, pipes and poles, nor shall it permit excavation or encumbrance to remain for a longer period than shall be necessary to do the work for which said excavation shall have been made.

Sec. 5.—Said company shall construct within the year of the passage of this ordinance at least 2,000 feet of underground conduits and the same shall be constructed with reference to carrying the wires on the streets where the wires are most numerous.

BLANKS ARE NOW READY. Heavy Fine for Non-Compliance with the Alien Laborer Law.

Blanks for making returns of alien employees under the act which went into effect Thursday last, are now ready for distribution at the county commissioners' office and can be secured upon application.

The law provides that the returns shall be made quarterly and a penalty of not less than \$200 and not more than \$1,000 is prescribed for non-compliance.

There are nine columns to be filled out on the blanks. They are headed as follows: Number of employees, names or unmutilated employes, place of birth, number of days worked in each of the three months of the quarter, total number of days worked, amount of tax collected at three cents per day, school district in which unmutilated employes reside.

The rush for naturalization papers still continues, both Judge Archibald and Judge Gunter, being required to hold naturalization court at the conclusion of the regular session to accommodate the big demand for papers.
