IMPRRISONED FOR DEBT.

William Lotta's Body Held for a Debt of \$5.25.

William Lotta, of 139 Seventh street, enjoys the unique, if not pleasant experience of being the first person sent to the Lackawanna county jail by an alder.nan under the old debtor's act. The debtor's cell is a separate and distinct department in the upper part of the jail. Under the law a debtor is not to be placed in the ordinary jail cell. It is a distinction without a difference in these days, but under the common law it obtained a significance.
