STRIKE SPREADS TO UNIONTOWN

Mines Are All Closed Through the Efforts of Organizer Miller.

Now at work in the coke region. All the mines on the Pittsburgh, Virginia and Charleston railroad are closed--A large quantity of coal leaving the coke region--The strike situation at other points.

Uniontown, Pa., July 20.--Through the efforts of Organizer Cameron Miller, the miners at the Boyd coal works, Hurst & Co., at Smocks station, and the Lynn coal works struck today and the mines are closed.

Will Not Strike. Canonsburg, Pa., July 20.--Boone mine of the Canonsburg Coal company and the mine of Cook & Son, at McGovern, which resumed operations this morning, ran all day without experiencing any trouble.

He Died Broken-Hearted. Self-Destruction of Howard G. Aument Near Lancaster. Lancaster, July 20.--Coroner Shank this morning received notice of the finding of the dead body of Howard G. Aument, 30 years of age, of Philadelphia, in a piece of woods near Coal Hill, a mile from Williamstown, on the road leading from that place to the Nickel Mines. Harry Pheniger and a man named Taylor, found the body yesterday as they were passing through the woods, and a revolver which was clutched in the dead man's right hand and a bullet hole in the right temple told of self-destruction.

Schulz Sentenced. Motion for a New Trial in Case of Pike County Murderer is Refused. Milford Pa., July 20.--Judge Purdy today refused to grant the motion for a new trial in the case of Herman Paul Schulz. Sentence of death was then passed upon the prisoner. Schulz on June 12, after a trial which lasted six days, was convicted of the murder of his wife. Schulz still maintains his innocence. He says that there was no reason whatever why he should have killed the woman.

Grant's Log Cabin Decaying. Structure Removed from St. Louis to Philadelphia Needs Care. Philadelphia, July 20.--The old log cabin once owned and occupied by General Grant, which he had brought here from St. Louis twenty years ago, and which is now in Fairmount Park, is fast decaying. Many of the logs have been rotted by the elements and others have been carried away by relic hunters.

Verdict Condemned. Jury Declares the Murderer of Mamie Willis Guilty of Second Degree. Pittsburgh, July 20.--Justice miscarried in the criminal court today. Joseph Eagleton, who killed Mamie Willis at Unity, was found guilty of murder in the second degree, and recommended to the full penalty of the law. The jury was out since Saturday, at 12:40 p. m. No verdict rendered here for years in a criminal court is so universally condemned by the county officials.

1,000 Men Made Happy. Coal Company Resumes Operations at Its Colliery in Shenandoah. Shenandoah, Pa., July 20.--Orders were received yesterday at Packer No. 5 colliery, operated by the Philadelphia Coal company, to resume operations this morning.

John Brendle's Suicide. Lebanon, Pa., July 20.--John Brendle, aged 45 years, of Schaefferstown, this county, committed suicide this morning by shooting himself in the head with a 28-calibre revolver. He was a prosperous farmer and was for many years justice of Heidelberg township, widely and well known, and two daughters survive the suicide.

DR. SWALLOW'S CASE. A Motion for Supersedeas and Stay of Proceedings is Entertained. Philadelphia, July 20.--The case of Dr. S. C. Swallow, of Harrisburg, editor of the Pennsylvania Methodist, who was yesterday fined \$500 and costs for libeling Captain John C. Delaney, superintendent of public buildings, came up before the Superior court here today, upon a motion for a supersedeas and stay of proceedings in the Dauphin county court.

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IN THE IRON MARKET. State of Trade as Compared with the Year 1896. Philadelphia, July 20.--The Bulletin of the American Iron and Steel association, in its issue of today says that the total production of pig iron in the United States in the first half of 1897 was 4,403,476 tons, as compared with the first half of 1896 there was a decrease in the first half of 1897 of 572,760 tons, as compared with the second half of 1896 there was an increase of 756,585 tons.

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GOVERNOR VETOES THE ORME BILL

It Imposed a Tax of Ten Per Cent. on Orders, Checks, Etc.

THE OTHER MEASURES DISAPPROVED

A Defense of the Item in the General Appropriation Bill Referring to Grace Church is Made--If a Dishonest Dollar is in It, the Governor Promises to Smite It "Like Every Other Steal."

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THE CHURCH BILL. Governor Hastings said in defense of the item of \$45,537.36 in the general appropriation bill for fitting up Grace church for the use of the legislature that every contractor under the regular schedule of competitive bidding was called upon to perform his part of the work at the competitive price under which he received the contract for doing the ordinary work for the state. All the bills were examined, compared and audited by the superintendent of the work, the house buildings and grounds committee and the board of public buildings and grounds before the act was drawn for the appropriation.

"TERRIBLE PETE'S" FATE. Governor Hastings Declines to Postpone the Hanging. Harrisburg, July 20.--Governor Hastings has refused to respite Peter Wassil, alias "Terrible Pete," who is to be hanged Thursday at Wilkes-Barre. Wassil talked into an Edison phonograph in the Wilkes-Barre jail yesterday, and this afternoon the cylinder was brought to Harrisburg by the prisoner's counsel.

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SCHOOL DIRECTORS TO GO TO JAIL. Pottsville, July 20.--School Directors Joseph Clemens, Michael Conroy, Martin Delaney, Michael Whalen, James Kenna and Thomas J. Devlin, of Blythe township, found guilty recently of misdemeanor in office, all sentenced to imprisonment and costs, exceeding \$100,000, and costs.

Prohibition Headquarters. Harrisburg, July 20.--The central committee of the Prohibition party met here today and decided to open the campaign about the middle of August. State headquarters will be established in this city, the home of Rev. Dr. Silas C. Swallow, the nominee for state treasurer.

Run Down by an Express. Harrisburg, July 20.--George Sterner, of Duncannon, aged 18 years, was run down this morning by the seashore express and instantly killed. He had jumped from a freight car and did not see the passenger train.

A Branch of Promise Suit. Black Creek, July 20.--Miss Amelia F. Smith, of this place, has sued John Krouse for breach of promise and asks \$5,000 damages. He is married.

THE HOLY ROLLERS. Practices of a Sect is Spreading All Over Eastern Maine. Orland, Me., Letter in Standard. "Anything which Christ did I can do," the keystone of the faith of the Holy Ghost Evangelists, a sect organized in this town about two years ago, which is now spreading all over eastern Maine. The leaders of the faith are Mary McIntyre, who came here from Waldo county two years ago and organized a prosperous church, and Elder James Woodworth of Syracuse, N. Y., who has been in Bangor and its vicinity about a year. Though the members of the sect are great stress upon prayer and laying on of hands, they are not Christian Scientists, and claim no affinity with the faith healers. The new cult begins where the other two leave off, accepting nobody but hopeless sinners and confirmed invalids. Anything which the penitent must make ready and satisfactory answers before he is allowed to rise. The sins of a lifetime must be confessed in detail, and the innermost secrets made public. Having rolled across the floor until everybody is satisfied and hands no more questions to ask, the subject is assisted to his feet and conducted to a rostrum, where he is proclaimed the brother of Christ and told to go forth and perform miracles.

Killed by a Freight Train. Allentown, Pa., July 20.--William L. Laubach, of Catasauqua, aged 60 years, a coal miner, tried to cross the Lehigh Valley railroad head of a moving freight train, in this city, at noon today and was struck and instantly killed. He leaves a widow, son and daughter. His son is a prominent Philadelphia druggist.

Gold Found in Pennsylvania. Titusville, July 20.--A Denver (Col.) prospector, E. Steinmetz, has discovered quartz in this vicinity, which contains gold. It is claimed that some of the samples of quartz will assay \$1,500 to the ton. A number of farms have been leased near the English settlement.
