## CURIOS MINE CAVE.

Has Done Much Damage to the Property of Jacob Farber, of 2902 Frink Street.

A mine cave under the property of Jacob Farber of 2902 Frink street, was reported in Monday's issue of The Tribune. Yesterday a Tribune reporter visited the scene of the cave. The Farber property is on the West mountain where the vein slants upwards and crops out. The first hole has increased in size to about 40 feet across and eight feet away is another hole, which measures about 20 feet across. They are unusually deep on account of the pitching vein below.

Mr. Farber stated that a small settlement appeared in his garden about two weeks ago, but the heavy rains of last week had caused the big caving. As near as can be judged from the outside each hole locates the face of a chamber worked on the vein at this point. These chambers are connected with the Price shaft workings.

Allowing for pillars, one chamber would come just underneath the rear foundation wall of the house and the next would take his front fence and the roadbed of Frink street, should other caves occur.

Mr. Farber owns nearly an acre of land and the double frame dwelling, one side of which he occupies himself. The loss of garden produce and fruit trees, vines, etc., alone amount to several hundred dollars. The remainder of his plot indicates his industry and pride in cultivating his land. Here and there fruit trees hang full with ripe fruit and his grape vines will yield a great quantity of beautiful fruit. Mr. Farber sold a property on Sweetland street and purchased his present property about a year ago. He has reported the trouble to the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western company officials.
