

Rudderham and Weigand contributed toward three of the Miners' four runs. The Grays were first at bat but Joe Knight's single with two out was all that developed in the introductory inning. The Miners tallied one on Walters' single, Barry's force hit, an infield grounder and Massey's two-baser to right-center.

SLOW AT THE START.

In the second a single and in the third Lyons' two-bagger, with two out, and a base on balls was all that developed for the Grays, Scranton's only portion in these two innings was a single by Barry with two out.

The Miners scored their second run in the fourth, with two out, on Eagan's force hit, Rudderham's wild throw to catch Peter napping at first and a passed ball. Another run, the third, developed in the fifth on Boyd's single, passed ball, Johnson's life and Walter's single.

From the fourth to the eighth inning inclusive, two bases on balls, a hit-by-pitcher, an error by Maguire and a fungo single by Knight over second offered the Grays their only opportunities for getting on the bases; but only in the eight when Knight made his single and Dixon was hit by a pitched ball, with two out, did more than one of these calamaties appear in any one of those five innings.

In the eighth Weigand fumbled Bar-ry's grounder and the latter's fast running made him safe by an eyelash. He went to second on Bonner's sacrifice, to third on a passed ball and home on Massey's fly to Knight. From base to base Barry gave an exhibition of running as he would have been put out at any of those points but for his speed.

MADE A GOOD BLUFF.

The Grays made a good bluff and came very near to scoring in the ninth. With one out Bassett and Murray made up their minds to walk to first and their patience was rewarded by eight bad balls. "Silver" Braun was put in to bat in place of Rudderham and struck out after having the long end of three balls and one strike. Weigand forced Murray at second and the agony was over. In detail:
