JOHN L. UMPIRED.

But It Was Fortunate He Had Keefe with Him to Settle Disputed Plays.

There were two star features of yesterday's game between the Miners and Burns' Springfield Ponies. One was yours truly John L. Sullivan who was assisted by Keefe in umpiring the game, but the real attraction was the game itself which was replete with fireworks and oratory from the call of time and which saw both teams scoring four runs each at the wind-up, the Miners winning out by one run.

While many errors were made they were overlooked in the bitterness of the struggle, the-at times-good pitching and some of the best base-running over seen on any grounds. John L. was anchored back of the rubber to adjudicate balls and strikes and it was fortunate that his services were confined to that department of an umpire's work and that Keefe was there to untangle the trouble on the bases or John L. would still be trying to solve a few problems in base ball. However, he performed his part with unusual accuracy and neither team profitted or was roasted by him. Twenty-five hundred persons saw the game.

The big cross-firing Mains did the turn on the rubber for the Ponies and, excepting the first inning, kept the Miners' hits scattered up to the eighth when three hits for five bases, a walk and Brouther's error developed four runs, one more than enough to offset arm-work became poor and he made the biggest fool error on record and nearly lost the game.
