VERY BUSY DAY IN THE COUNTY COURTS

Large Number of Opinions Handed Down by the Judges. SUBSTANCE OF THE DECISIONS

Judge Gunster's Opinion in Cases Crowding Out of the Arrest of Four Men for Fishing--Judgment of Justice of the Peace Northup is Reversed--Proper Notice Must Be Given by Owners of Private Ponds.

Court held its midsummer session yesterday and transacted an immense amount of business. Beside handing down a large number of opinions the judges heard motions from fifty-six different attorneys. That is the largest number that has ever appeared before the court here in a single day.

Other Opinions. Judge Edwards handed down an opinion in the interpleader case of Amelia Tiffany against A. Richmond, making absolute the plaintiff's rule to show cause why judgment should not be entered for costs.

Judge Gunster refused to grant a new trial to Squire J. B. Lesh, of Newton, in the case in which he was defendant and Hixler & Correll, of Easton, plaintiffs. The rule for judgment for want of a sufficient affidavit of defense was made absolute by Judge Edwards in the case of Stephen Tunstall to the use of J. W. Fello against Walter W. Winton.

NETTLETON AGAINST CARLY. An opinion was filed by Judge Archibald in the case of F. E. Nettleton against Josiah D. Carly, rule to open judgment, in which the rule was made absolutely and an issue awarded to be made up by the plaintiff declaring in assumpsit upon the contract for so much money as is due and owing by the defendant thereon, the defendant pleading non assumpsit. Payment and payment with leave thereto.

NEW COURT RULES ARE HANDED DOWN

Were Framed for the Purpose of Decreasing Number of Indictments. COSTS WILL ALSO BE LESSENER

Hereafter When Two or More Persons Are Concerned in Any Way in Any Indictable Offense Their Names Will Appear on the Same Indictment--Justice of Peace Must Not Make Out Different Transcripts for Offenses Growing Out of the Same Transaction.

Seven additional rules of the Lackawanna county courts were handed down yesterday by Judge Archibald. They are as follows: Rule 47: In all cases where two or more persons have committed an indictable offense, the names of all who were concerned therein shall be contained in one bill of indictment for which no more costs shall be allowed than if it contained the name of one person.

LANGOWSKI SENTENCED.

Will Have to Spend Thirty Days in the County Jail. Daniel Langowski, the editor of a Polish paper, published on the South Side, who was convicted several months ago of having libeled Rev. Bruno Ivanowski, pastor of the Polish Catholic church at Frickburg, was called before Judge Archibald yesterday for sentence. There were three charges on which he was sentenced. On the first he was fined \$25 and directed to spend thirty days in the county jail. The second sentence was the same, but is to run concurrent with the first. On the third he was directed to pay the costs. The imposing of sentence was twice postponed on account of the illness of Langowski's wife.

FELL IN A FIT.

South Side Woman Was Taken Home in a Patrol Wagon. Mrs. Peter Noll, a middle aged German woman and widow, who resides on Crown avenue near No. 30 school, fell in an epileptic fit while waiting for a car at the corner of Jefferson avenue and Spruce street early yesterday afternoon. In falling the woman's face struck the retaining wall along the South Side bridge approach and a large piece of skin was torn from her cheek. Dr. Rose was summoned from his home near by. The case was not one for the hospital, as the woman soon regained consciousness and was taken by the police in a patrol wagon to her home.

ACCUSED OF STEALING TOOLS.

T. J. Canavan Has Too Former Employees Held for Court. John Baldwin and A. Hibson, of Green Ridge, were held to bail in the sum of \$300 each by Alderman Millar to answer at court a charge of larceny, preferred by T. J. Canavan, the Linden street marble cutter. During a recent illness a number of tools mysteriously disappeared from Mr. Canavan's shop. These were afterwards found, he alleges, in a shop in Green Ridge conducted by the two defendants.
