SCHOOL BOARD MEETING.

Institute Arranged -- Other Local Business Transacted.

A long session of the city school board was held on Monday evening and various matters of business connected with the schools were considered. Estimates were received for repairs. At their request the Mitchell Hose company was released from their contract with the board.

A communication was received from County Superintendent Taylor in regard to the institute and read. He desired to ascertain if the city teachers would attend the county institute. President Colville reported that the city superintendent had been instruct-ed to consult the teachers as to their wishes in the matter. Superintendent Forbes stated that he had consulted all but six of the teachers. Forty-two favored holding the institute at home. and two were in favor of going to Scranton. Of the others who had not been personally consulted he thought that three at least desired a local institute. It was found that no aid by way of appropriation from the board would be required. Mr. Alexander moved that the superintendent and teachers be authorized to hold a city institute. The motion was adopted. The superintendent, in announcing the resignation of Miss Mary Forbes as teacher, informed the board that two vacancies were to be filled. Edgar R. Heckman, a graduate of Dickinson college, was elected to fill the place held formerly by Miss Hyde and his salary fixed at \$65. Miss Corbin, of New York, was appointed at a salary of \$35

to take the place vacated by Miss Forbes. The teachers are arranged as follows: Central High school, Mr. Heckman, Misses Corbin and Ella Boland; Miss Ella Harte in place of Miss Swi-gest at No. 2 school; Misses Bridget Gilmmartin, Katle Walsh and Katle Kennedy to No. 3 school; Misses Lydia Gilmartin, Martha Hards, and Anna Loftus at No. 6 school; Miss Kate Githins at No. 7; Misses Gabriella Coleman

and Anna McLean to No. 8: Misses Margaret Murphy and Lizzie Walsh to school No. 9. Several resolutions were passed respecting rules. The committee on the course of study will print the order in a pamphlet. Maurice Forbes was elected as an attendance officer. The contract for hauling coal was awarded to John Booth.

CURFEW ORDINANCE.

It Is Introduced at a Meeting of the

Common Conneil. At the meeting of the common councll on Monday evening the Curfew ordinance, prepared by W. J. Glennon chairman of the judiciary and legislation committee, was introduced. A favorable report, signed by the committee present, Messrs, Glennon, Brandow and Lewis, was also presented.

The proposed law affects children under fourteen years of age, during the months from March to September inclusive. It is made unlawful for such persons to remain upon the streets after the hour of 9.30 p. m. and from September to the last day of February inclusive, after 8.30 p. m., unless accompanied by a parent or guardian, or is on an errand, or is required by the employment engaged in to be upon the streets. There must be a reasonable necessity for those having legal custody of those under fourteen to permit them to be out in the prohibited hours. The penality is to be a sum not exceeding five dollars, with costs, upon conviction. The members of the police may make arrests and then complaint may be made and a warrant served. No children or minor can be placed in confinement, but the parents or guardians must be notified. It is made the duty of the mayor to make investigation and in certain necessary cases cause proper proceedings where children are growing up as vagrants or are incorrigible.
