SOME LATE NEW THINGS.

Recent inventions which have been introduced to the public.

The use of a crossed drive chain, running over a driving pulley and an adjustable idler pulley and then around a pair of drums attached to the front and rear axles of the car, to be used instead of toothed gearing in propelling the car, has just been patented.

An invention which will prove useful to ticket agents or any one having a large number of tickets to be disposed of rapidly is a case to hold the ticket, in the side of which is a spring slide, which, when pushed toward the end of the box, brings the tickets out through a slot one at a time, one side wall of the box being held by springs in order to keep the tickets pressed against the side.

One of the most novel excavating machines of recent date has been patented by a North Dakota man and consists of two immense earth augurs, attached to a portable upright frame and operated by power, the augurs bring the earth to the face, where it can be shoveled to one side.

To prevent corrosion of boiler tubes by contact with the neck, a recently patented button has the back made of cork.

A reversible mail bag receiver and deliverer, for use on single track railroads, has an upright rod placed in the center of the car doorway, which can be turned in either direction of the mail clerk, the upper portion having an arm for catching the mail bag and the lower part a projecting hook to deliver the bag to a receiver at the side of the track, the action catching the bag on the lower arm.
