SOFT COAL MINERS STILL DETERMINED Will Not Go Back on the Terms Offered.

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Pittsburg, Sept. 3.—Colonel Reno's miners at McDonald, Pa., will not go back at the terms offered by him yesterday. The committee appointed to present this ultimatum to the men reported today that the men were heartily in the right and it was decided to accept no rate except 69 cents and not to work for that price unless all other mines do the same.

Nothing has yet been received here from Columbus and both operators and miners are at sea. There seems to be great doubt of settlement on account of the stand by the miners' officials. The operators say they will not pay the 69 cent rate and will go ahead with their arrangements to start the mines with new men.

FIGHT GROWS WARMER. Lively Sessions Ahead for the Jr. O. U. A. M.

Harrisburg, Sept. 3.—The Junior Order United American Mechanics' fight for state council secretary in Pennsylvania is said by members of the order to be getting warmer every day. The present incumbent, Edward Deemer, of Philadelphia, who is being opposed by Charles N. Raymond, of Lancaster, the well known past state councillor upon the platform of reduction of expenses per capita tax and the abolition of unnecessary securities in the order, is said to be considering the advisability of conceding the claims of the opposition to him, and dispensing with his salary.
