#### FATAL ACCIDENT.

On Thursday evening John McCarty, of Wilkes-Barre, while on the Delawar and Hudson railroad, was struck by a south bound train and instantly kill-The accident occurred near the bridge north of Simpson. The man, in company with one Madden, had been riding on a coal train going north, and was struck by the down train, an instant after leaving it. Detective Crippen arrived in town soon after the accident to investigate the affair. The man called Madden acknowledged to the detective that his name was John Gandelphia. non. He said that he had known Mc-Carty only a few days, and that they were looking for work. It is said that the man who was killed has a brother in Wilkes-Barre, one Michael McCarty, but as yet no information has been re ceived. The unfortunate young man was a miner about 23 years of age.
