

THE SITUATION AT HAZLETON

Coroner's Jury Investigating the Lattimer Shooting.

STATEMENT OF DANIEL FERRY

He Alleges That Deputy Wrought Shot at a Man on the Railroad Tracks—General Gobin Will Probably Order the Troops Withdrawn in a Day or Two.

Hazleton, Pa., Sept. 24.—The coroner's jury, investigating the death of the Lattimer victims, met again today and heard additional testimony, Charles Gascott, the school teacher, John Welsh, Stephen Charles, Daniel Ferry, and other miners, testified, but nothing new was induced, with the exception of the statement made by Daniel Ferry that after the first volley was fired, Deputy Wrought shot at a man on the railroad tracks. After a half dozen witnesses had been examined, Coroner McKee closed the inquest and the jury retired. The jury will meet tomorrow evening to deliberate and decide upon a verdict.

RUNAWAY'S FATAL RESULT.

James Wilde Was Thrown Head-First Against a Wall and Died. Media, Sept. 24.—James Wilde, a member of the firm of Emanuel Hey & Co., at Heyville, a manufacturing village in Springfield township, died last night from injuries received about noon yesterday in a runaway accident.

Mr. Wilde, accompanied by his wife, had just entered his carriage to drive to Chester, when the horse, which was being driven without blinds, took fright at the top of the wagon and ran away down a steep hill. At the bottom the wagon overturned and Mr. Wilde was thrown head-first against the wall of one of the mill buildings. His skull was fractured and he never regained consciousness after the accident.

Mr. Wilde was about 60 years of age. He was one of the best known citizens in that locality.

INSANE DOCTOR'S AWFUL FLIGHT.

His Bag of Gold Missing and He Is in Great Distress.

Wellsville, Pa., Sept. 24.—Confined in a novel five by seven feet, at Liberty, with only a little opening in it for the admission of food to him, a lunatic commission has just discovered Dr. William M. Wiseman, clad in rags and in great distress. The doctor, who has been insane for eighteen months, is worth about \$5,000. A sum of gold coin exceeding \$1,500, which Wiseman is known to have kept in a shot bag being confined in the novel, is missing.

MORE BILLS IN EQUITY ARE FILED

Two Other Firms of Architects Join the Crusade.

OBJECT TO ACT OF COMMISSION

The Throwing Out of Plans is a Violation of the Obligations Assumed, They Allege, and Would Deprive Petitioners of the Opportunity of Securing Any of the Prizes.

Harrisburg, Sept. 24.—Gowen, Hood & Ingersoll, of Philadelphia, and Wolf & Bailey, of this city, on behalf of Cope & Stewardson, Philadelphia, and Alden & Hartson, of Pittsburg, two firms of architects, submitting competitive plans for the new state capitol, filed a bill in equity against the members of the state capitol building commission late this afternoon.

The action of the commission in throwing out the plans as submitted is a violation of the obligations assumed thereunder and will result in depriving the petitioners of the opportunity of securing one of the prizes therein provided for, and that further it is a disregard and violation of the public duty resting upon the commissioners.

They ask for an injunction restraining the commissioners from selecting an architect in any manner other than provided in the established programme and that the defendants be decreed to specifically carry out the provisions of that programme.

A hearing of the motion to continue the injunctions was fixed by Judge McPherson for Friday, Oct. 1, at 12 o'clock.

SAY HE SLEW HIS PARTNER.

Body Exhumed on Evidence Obtained Recently.

Bellfonte, Sept. 24.—Late last night Officers Montgomery and Mullen arrested Peter Mendis, rag dealer and carpet cleaner, on the grave charge of murdering his former partner, who had a lot of money, on Jan. 7, 1896. Maria's sudden and mysterious death was at first attributed to hemorrhage of the lungs.

Evidence secured recently led to the exhumation of the body yesterday, and the stomach and intestines were sent to a Philadelphia doctor for examination. The evidence against Mendis is said to be strong. The day of Maria's death his wife and family arrived in New York from Italy, but were sent back by Mendis.

G. F. care Tribune. ORDINANCE. AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR the regulation of electric street railway companies in the Borough of Taylor. Be it ordained and enacted by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Taylor in town Council assembled as follows, to wit: Section 1.—To levy and collect for general revenue purposes and for the purpose of further regulating the use of public highways in the Borough of Taylor by Street Railway Companies, or their successors, lessees, or assigns, a license tax not exceeding twenty-five dollars (\$25) for each street railway car used and operated on the said streets and public highways of the said Borough of Taylor by said street railway companies and their successors, lessees or assigns. Section 2.—It shall be the duty of the Burgess of said Borough, upon payment to him of said license tax for each of said street railway cars, to issue a permit good for one year from date of issue, and the amount paid for the license tax, and the date thereof. Section 3.—Every corporation or street railway company, and their successors, or assigns, offending against the provisions of this ordinance, shall be required to pay a fine to the said Burgess, not exceeding the sum of five (\$5) dollars for each day the license fee remains unpaid, and said fine shall be recoverable as debts due to the said Burgess.
