### THE SITUATION AT HAZLETON

Joroner's Jury Investigating the Lattimer Shooting.

STATEMENT OF DANIEL FERRY

He Alleges That Deputy Wrough Shot at a Man on the Railroad Tracks .. General Gobin Will Probably Order the Troops Withdrawn in a Day or Two.

Hazleton, Pa., Sept. 24.-The coroner's jury, investigating the death of the Lattimer victims, met again today and heard attitional testimony. Charles Gascott, the school teacher; John Welsh, Stephen Charles, Daniel Ferry, and other miners, testified, but nothing new was induced, with the exception of the statement made by Daniel Ferry that after the first volley was fired, Deputy Wrought shot at a man on the railroad tracks. After a half dozen witnesses had been examined, Coroner McKee closed the inquest and the jurymen retired. The jury will met tomorrow evening to deliberate and decide upon a verdict

The Lehigh Valley Coal company's men at Jeanesville held a meeting this afternoon and unanimously agreed to return to work next Tuesday. The company has made no concessions and the resumption at Jeanesville now puts an end to the strike.

It was the intention of General Gobin to order the withdrawal of part of militia, but the rain interfered. ### RUNAWAY'S FATAL RESULT.

#### James Wilde Was Thrown Head-first Against a Wall and Died.

Media, Sept. 24.-James Wilde, member of the firm of Emanuel Hey & Co., at Heyville, a manufacturing village in Springfield township, died last night from injuries received about noon yesterday in a runaway acci-

Mr. Wilde, accompanied by his wife had just entered his carriage to drive to Chester, when the horse, which was being driven without blinds, took fright at the top of the wagon and ran away, down a steep hill. At the bottom the wagon overturned and Mr. Wilde was thrown head-first against the wall of one of the mill buildings. His skull was fractured and he never regained consciousness after the accident.

Mrs. Wilde was also thrown out and received serious injuries about the head and shoulders. It is believed she will Mr. Wilde was about 60 years of age

He was one of the best known citizens in that locality.

agent for Berks. The original purchasers in this county numbered 1,427. These lands are now owned by at least 5,000 people. This state of affairs exists in many sections of Pennsylvania. County surveyors are actively at work running lines to see who must pay these back-standing claims. All the happiness of dollar wheat has received a damper. Attorney Long says: "These claims are for all townships in Berks, sixty in number, excepting one, Amity township. Part of the purchase money is owing on between 70,000 and 80,000 acres, about one-sixth of the county. In some townships money is owing on several thousand acres.

### THE HEROISM OF CAPTAIN BLIZZARD

Philadelphia, Sept. 24.-The heroic actions of Captain Blizzard, of the steam tug C. W. Morse, which reached the Delaware Breakwater this afternoon with the barge Western Belle, which has six feet of water in her hold and is leaking badly, saved that craft from total destruction and her crew

from a watery grave. In tow of the Morse, the Western Belle, Captain Task, for Providence, and the Forest Belle, for New Bedford, left Norfolk on Wednesday, and the same night, when hardly across the Chesapeake bay, heavy gales were experienced which culminated on Thursday in a northeast hurricane and the Western Belle sprang a leak.

Captain Blizzard succeeded in an-choring the Forest Belle under the and and with all possible speed headed for the capes and succeeded in an-choring the leaky craft in harbor. Later the C. W. Morse put off to sea for the Forest Belle, which she will tow to her destination. A survey will be held on the Western Belle.

William Temple, a son of Mrs Temple, said he had known the girl to go to the stable and just for the fun it gave her, beat the horses in the stall with a rake and otherwise ill-She also threatened to set fire to the barn.

The jury found the girl guilty as charged, and Judge Clayton ordered her sent to the House of Refuge.

### MORE BILLS IN **EQUITY ARE FILED**

Two Other Firms of Architects Join the Crusade.

OBJECT TO ACT OF COMMISSION

The Throwing Out of Plans Is a Violation of the Obligations Assumed, They Allege, and Would Deprive Petitioners of the Opportunity of Securing Any of the Prizes.

Harrisburg, Sept. 24.-Gowen, Hood Ingersoll, of Philadelphia, and Wolf & Bailey, of this city, on behalf of Cope & Stewardson, Philadelphia, and Alden & Harlow, of Pittsburg, two firms of architects, submitting competitive plans for the new state capitol, filed a bill in equity against the members of the state capitol building commission late this afternoon.

The action of the commission in throwing out the plans as submitted is a violation of the obligations assumed thereunder and will result in depriving the petitioners of the opportunity of securing one of the prizes therein provided for, and that further it is a disregard and violation of the public duty resting upon the commis-

They ask for an injunction restraining the commissioners from selecting an architect in any manner other than provided in the established programme and that the defendants be decreed to specifically carry out the provisions of that programme.

Section 3.—Every corporation or street railway company, and their successors, or assigns, offending against the provisions of this ordinance, shall be required to pay a fine to the said borough, not exceeding the sum of five (5) dollars for each day the license fee remains unpaid, and said fine shall be recoverable as debts of like amount are by law recoverable.
