HER PLEA AVAILD HER NAUGHT.

Alderman Moses Deals Out Justice, Though a Woman Pleads.

An up-to-date Paris in the person of Palaga Yursuki appeared before Alderman Moses last evening to plead the case of an unfortunate lover, but of an indiscreet father. Palaga in Polish means Della in English, and Miss Della and her father, John Yursuki, reside at the Continental. Hugh McLaughlin is a hotelkeeper at the Continental, and it was for him that the warrant was issued at the instance of Miss Della, who alleged that the hotelkeeper had assaulted her father Sunday evening.

The hearing brought out the facts that John Yursuki, John Woluchink and others comprised an important church committee, and after attending to the church duties in the morning had been visiting several hotels during the afternoon and evening. The party finally rounded up in McLaughlin's place of business, and upon being refused drinks became somewhat boisterous. They were ordered out, but Yursuki and Woluchink refused to go, and were put out, receiving at that time the alleged blows. A doctor was summoned to care for Yursuki, while Woluchink was taken to the Hotel St. Joseph, he being the unknown Polandier whose head was sewed up last Sunday evening.

Witnesses for the hotelkeeper stated that the Poles had thrown stones and the alderman believing that both parties were equally to blame, dismissed the case, placing the costs upon McLaughlin. Miss Della, who had plead her father's case, seemed much disgusted in consequence.
