

GRAND JURY SAYS SOME SAUCY THINGS

Court House Attacks Come in for a Severe Dressing Down.

TIPSTAFF JOSTLING A GRAND JUROR

And the Grand Jury Resents the Indignity by Jumping on Tipstaves in General and All the Other Menial Attaches of the Court House—District Attorney Jones Receives a Nice Compliment for His Courtesy and Attentiveness.

The elevator man, the janitor and the tipstaves at the court house received a dressing down at the hands of the grand jury in its final report yesterday morning. While the report was being read the defendants were called before court and directed to listen to what was said. The report was as follows:

To the Honorable the Judges of Lackawanna County.

The grand inquest inquiring in and for said Lackawanna county, respectfully beg leave to report as follows, to wit: Our sincere thanks are due to District Attorney John H. Jones, for his uniform courtesy and his faithful attention to all matters that came before us, having disposed of nearly one thousand cases in thirteen days, giving every prosecution the benefit of a prompt and impartial hearing. We consider him an able and worthy public official.

We have visited the county buildings and report as follows: We find the county jail to be well kept, neat and clean, and the food to be of good quality.

First—We recommend the gutter in the yard near the building to be repaired at once.

Second—That some posts be set in the yard to hold the clothes lines.

Third—A sewing machine is badly needed.

Fourth—That closets or shelves be placed in the rear of the jury room, no suitable place to keep clean clothes.

At the court house we recommend and strongly urge that a heavy covering be placed on the floor of the jury room to deaden the sound. Also easy chairs, as those now there are simply outrageous.

There should be an electric bell from the grand jury room to the district attorney's office; also ice water tanks, combs, brushes, mirrors and towels in all jury rooms.

There should be better service of the elevator, and more courteous treatment to those wishing to use it.

We also recommend that the driveway in the basement be paved.

We find the building dirty and badly cared for, especially the arbitration room, halls and windows, and would recommend better janitor service.

We wish to call your attention to the rough and unbecomingly manner in which the tipstaves serve the public during court. As an example, one of our grand jurors during the week was suddenly and roughly grabbed and nearly thrown down the stairs by one of these public servants.

We denounce the practice of many aldermen and justices of the peace of the county in sending many trivial cases to court without any evidence to sustain them, and done merely for the costs that follow.

The final report of cases contained 424 ignored bills and 46 true bills. This makes a total of 243 true and 554 ignored bills which the jury has passed upon.

MAULIFFE IS READY.

Lightweight World's Champion Reached Scranton Yesterday—Appears in Splendid Shape for the Bout.

Jack McAuliffe, the premier of lightweights and present holder of the championship title arrived in this city yesterday afternoon on the 5.50 Lackawanna train from New York city. He was accompanied by Jack Sheehan, of "Jack" fame, who will, as he is in his corner tomorrow night, and manager Skelly of the American Sporting Club. McAuliffe was a surprise, in point of condition, to those who thought his recent retirement might have interfered in the ring with the fast, plucky and scientific work for which he has for years been noted.

The party established their headquarters at the Conway House where a large number of persons called to pay their respects to the famous boxer. McAuliffe early in the evening expressed a desire for entertainment and was taken with a few newspapermen to Davis' theater. Later he lunched at Zonke's on Penn Avenue, and at 11 o'clock sought his bed. This morning he will do road work and will probably choose Elmhurst boulevard for his route. In the afternoon he will give a bag-punching exhibition at the Scranton Bicycle club house.

Word comes from Pittston that Tommy Ryan, who reached there Monday afternoon, continues to feel in the best possible condition and ready to make the fight of his life tomorrow night. The bout has engaged no little attention here outside the world as shown in telegrams from Syracuse, Philadelphia, Rochester and other points, indicating that sports from those cities wish sent reserved for their tomorrow night.
