THE CRAMPS WILL BUILD NEW BOATS

They Will Be Speedy First-Class Vest is in Every Particular, Calculated to Reduce the Time Between Northern and West India Fruit Ports.

Philadelphia, Oct. 1 .- The Press tomorrow will say:

Negotiations are in progress among number of capitalists in Philadelphia, New York and Boston, which, if successfully carried out, will result in the substitution of American-built steamships for the large gumber of foreign-built craft now engaged in the and harness also sustained little dam-West India fruit trade. The new ships will be built here by the Cramps, who are largely interested in the undertaking, and will be speedy, first class versels in every particular, calculated to reduce to the lowest time the pass age between Northern and .. est India fruit ports.

Among those who are named to figure in the incorporation of the new undertaking are John Dougherty, of Cramps; John D. Probst, A. S. Heldelbach, Clement S. Asbury and Jules S. Bache, of New York, and William Bassett, of Boston.

It is argued that there is but one corporation operating a line of ships in the fruit trade at the present time. and they have a monopoly trading out of Baltimore, Philadelphia and Boston, under separate and distinct corporate names, but virtually controlled n Boston

At Cramps those in charge were very reticent, but consented to say that the matter of building a fleet of speedy ships for the American and West India trade was a subject that is being considered.

The new corporation will be known as the United States and West India Steamship company, and expects to be subsidized by the government, as are a number of others of the American lines to the West Indies.



When the Owensforce neared the strikers they were received with a fusilade of stones, sticks and other missiles, nany of which struck the miners. Superintendent Owens is among those njured, but his injury is not a serious

The superintendent, fearing that ome serious trouble and perhaps loodshed might result in case he persted in marching his men to the vorks, ordered them to right about nd they were subsequently dispersed While the shower of missiles was at s height the superintendent recogized several of the offending strikers nd he went at once before 'Squire Chret, swore out warrants for their rrest and they were in a short time ter taken into custody.

FIRE AT LANCASTER.

Several Business Houses Consumed

Loss \$40,000. Lancaster, Oct. L-A fire broke out in a large four-story brick building at to reside permanently. Grant and Market streets, owned by Philip Lebzelter, shortly before midnight. It was almost entirely destroyed, the walls alone being left. The building was occupied by Thomas A. Anderson's machine shop, Andrew Gut fleisch's laundry and Richter & Sons' silver plating works. The fire started in the cellar and shot up an elevator to the roof. The firemen had great difficulty in getting at the fire, but in an hour had it under control. The American House, a leading hotel

ilso owned by Lebzelter, was on fire a dozen times, but was saved, although badly damaged. Th new city market house, just across a narrow street from the fire, was also saved. Loss, \$40,000.

GEORGE R. PYNE DIES.

Chief Page of House of Representa tives Expires at Harrisburg.

Harrisburg, Oct. 1-George R. Pyne chief page of the house of representatives, died of consumption tonight at his residence in this city. Mr. Pyne was in ill health the past eight months, although he was able to attend to his duties until Friday. His death was hastened by a murderous assault five weeks ago in an Atlantic City hotel by burglars, who stole his watch and liamond stud.

Mr. Pyne was 40 years old, and ten tars ago succeeded his brother, the late Andrew Pyne, as chief page. He was popular with the members of the legislature and politicians who visit the state capital and was well known through the state. A widow survives.
