# CRIMINAL CASES DOWN FOR TRIAL

Nearly Three Hundred Cases Are on the List for the Coming Term.

MANY OTHERS HAD TO GO OVER

District Attorney Jones Has Asked the Court to Call in Another Judge That Three Courts May Be Kept Running -- Van Horn Murder Case Is Set Down at the Head of the List for the Second Week.

District Attorney John R. Jones has completed the criminal trial list for October sessions. He has placed 292 cases upon the list and has asked the court to call in another judge that three courts may be kept going to dispose of this large list. He has placed all jail cases at the head of the list, that those who are in jail awaiting trial may have their cases promptly disposed of as under the law they are entitled. He has placed all the old cases on the list, as they are entitled to preference over the cases recently returned by the grand jury. The Van Horn murder case is at the head of the list for the second week.

He fears internal injuries and since the accident he has emitted blood incessantly.

Leitch remained at the alderman's office from 8 a. m. until 4 p. m., being unable to move from the result of his injuries. The three men were held under \$300 bail each to appear at court. Edwards went security for each.

# ALIEN TAX RETURNS.

Four Employers, Only, Have So Far

Complied with the Law. Only four employers of alien labor have up to date complied with the provision of the allen tax law, which requires that the first quarterly return made on Oct. 1. They are Murray, Kearney & Brown, of Dunmore, who turned in \$30.41; the Prudential Insurance company, whose alien employes contributed \$6.99; Thomas Coggins, with a \$1.23 remittance, and Franceso Armengola, who, as his eighteen cents contribution indicates, employed an

alien for one week. The big companies will probably not be heard from for some time yet, as they will require time to get their returns in shape.

Murray, Kearney & Brown have the distinction of being the first to comply with the law in this county and possibly in the state. Their return was in the hands of the county commissioners on the morning of Oct. 1.

# HIT HIM WITH A HOE.

Fight Among the Workmen on the Mulberry Street Pave.

Patrick Convey, a young man living n this city, was struck on the head with a hoe by an Italian yesterday afternon while both men were at work on the Mulberry street pave. Convey was taken to the Lackawanna hospital, where the wound on his head was dressed by Dr. A. J. Connell.

Convey, it appears, and an Italian were fighting when a second Italian came up from behind and brought down the hoe with full force on Convey's head. The scalp was cut for several inches, but the skull was not in jured. Convey was knocked senseless. The Italian was taken in tow by two other workmen. Bad blood has arisen between the several nationalities represented on the pave work because of the assault.

## DESERTION AND NON SUPPORT. Charge That Mrs. Jacob Gearhardt Brings Against Her Husband.

Mrs. Jacob Gearhardt, after two years' forbearance because of the disgrace to her children, yesterday clipped the wings of her erring husband, Jacob, who in all that time has not contributed one cent toward her support. Mrs. Gearhardt went before Alderman John T. Howe and swore out a warrant for the arrest of the man charging him with desertion and non support. He was held under \$500 ball to appear at court.
