KANSAS SUFFERS FROM DROUGHT.

Farmers in Sore Straits -- Wheat Acreage Reduced. Fort Scott, Kan., Oct. 10.-In Southeast-orn Kansas the drought that has continu-

ed unbroken for over two months is un-precedented. In Cherokee, Crawford and Montgomery counties not half an inch of rain has fallen in three months. In this city, according to the report of W. W. Dillard, the government observer, only .48 of an inch of rain has been precipitated in over six weeks, and for many weeks the water company has been channelling the Marmaton river for miles to let the water down from the depressions in the river bed. For a month or more the stock ponds have been dry, and the stock feeders and farmers generally have been compelled to drive their stock to the rivers for water. With a large per cent of them this means a drive each day of from three to ten miles.

The pastures are burned up, and most of the stock is being fed. Vegetation of all kinds is blighted and the trees have

all kinds is blighted and the trees have been prematurely stripped of their leaves. The merchants of the cities and towns where street sprinkling has necessarily been discontinued have experienced a ma-trial depreciation in their stock on ac-count of the dust having blown into the stores. On a windy day the stores are tightly closed and in many instances the goods are kept covered. Owing to the scarcity of water on the farms it is almost impossible for an over-land traveller to get water for himself or his stock. Nearly every farm gate bears a sign reading, "No Water Here." The condition of the soil is such that no ploughing has been done, and the acreage of winter wheat, which would acreage of winter wheat, which would have otherwise been larger than for many years, will be greatly reduced,
