ABYSSINIANS DEFEATED.

An Army of 3,000 Men Overwhelmed at Somaliland.

London, Oct. 13 .-- J. Bennett Standford, who has just returned from tak-ing part in an expedition to Somali-land, brings news of the annihilation at the end of June of an Abyssinian army of 3,000 men under the control of the famous general, Ras Mackonnen.

Mr. Standford said today: "While in the interior we came across a powerful Somali chief who had just returned from the fight. He told that the Abyssinian force had been raiding down the Webbe-Shebeyli river. The Somalis 'then overwhelmed them, al-lowing only sixty men to go back with the news of the defeat. Ras Mackonnen was killed. The affair occurred about one hundred miles from where we were. The whole neighborhood is still greatly excited."

ROCKAFELLOW SENTENCED.

Will Spend a Year in the Eastern

Penitentiary. Wilkes-Barre, Oct. 13 .- F. V. Rocka fellow, the former banker, convicted of receiving deposits when he knew his bank to be insolvent, was today sentenced to one year in the Eastern penitentiary and fined \$1,400. 
