THEY WERE BROTHERS. Why Colonel Kellogg's Life Was Spared by a Confederate. From the Chicago Times-Herald.

In December, 1864, when Kellogg was a colonel commanding his regiment, I accompanied him on a ride along the picket line a few miles to the left of Petersburg. By some means, and without knowing it, we got between the picket lines. We were brought to a halt suddenly by the following un-military salutation:

"Is that you, Colonel Kellogg?" Looking up, and about two rods to the right we saw a lieutenant and a dozen men in gray, who had apparently just taken their arms in preparation for serious business.

"That's my name, sir," answered the colonel. "Beg pardon—Colonel Kellogg. You were a captain at Gettysburg. Allow me to extend congratulations upon your promotion."
