

### THREE COURT ROOMS NOW IN OPERATION

Judge McClure, of Union County, Leads a Helping Hand.

### DAY'S LIST QUICKLY DISPOSED OF

A Witness Who Had No Regard for Court Etiquette-Archibald Girl Has Two Men Arrested for the Same Crime-Providence Women Convicted of Being a Common Scold. Defendants Escape Through Non-Appearance of Accusers.

The second week's session of the October term of criminal court opened yesterday with three judges sitting, the assistance of Hon. Harold S. McClure, of Union county, having been secured in expectation of the Van Horn murder case taking up all the time of the court in room No. 1. The postponement of this murder trial left the list for the day insufficient to keep the three courts busy and as a consequence an early adjournment was had. Judge Gunter, the last to be relieved, retiring at 3:30 o'clock.

Milton W. Lowry represented the commonwealth in the superior court room, where Judge McClure presided. Attorney M. J. McAndrew looked after the extra stenographic work.

One of the cases that came up in No. 1 developed some interesting features. Daniel Forbes, the owner of South Side quarry, was prosecuting Leon Olchefeld for the theft of some several loads of flagstones. Olchefeld alleged that he had a contract with Forbes to take all the stone he wanted at so much per foot and was simply acting under that contract when the alleged larceny occurred.

### IN A BAD MOOD

This defense was very aggravating to Forbes-who he might incidentally be remarked was in a mood admitting of easy aggravation-and he proceeded to give vent to his feelings in an unconstrained manner in almost every answer he made to the cross-examining attorney.

"That fool Polander can't work no such bluff here" was one of his replies when Attorney Olyer asked him concerning the alleged contract. And then he rejoined "What the hell difference does that make anyone?"

When the laughter following these remarks had been suppressed, the court looked daggers at the witness but evidently realizing that he was to be pitied rather than punished allowed his offences to go unavenged. In Judge McClure's court Edward George, of Dunmore, was charged by Jacob Zintel, of Archibald, with being his ought-to-be non-in-law. George for a defense showed by the depositions of "Squire Munley, of Archibald, that John Young, of that place, was held for the same crime some time before he was accused. The grand jury ignored the bill against Young. The Zintel girl admitted on the stand that she had had both men arrested for the same offense. The jury was out at adjournment.

Not guilty, costs divided, was the finding of the jury in the case of Thos. Connors charged before Judge Edwards by Hotelkeeper Stephen Flanagan, of Luzerne street, with assault and battery. Attorney E. F. Conroy appeared for the defense and City Solicitor M. A. McGinley assisted Mr. Thomas on the commonwealth's side.

John Tolra, accused of aggravated assault and battery upon Joseph Flanagan, of Luzerne street, was returned guilty of simple assault and battery. He was defended by Attorney R. A. Zimmerman, Attorney George Beale assisted District Attorney Jones in the prosecution.

### A COMMON SCOLD.

Kate Flanagan, of Providence, was convicted of being a common scold. The charge was preferred by her brother-in-law, P. J. Ward, who, among other things, alleged that she was compelled to move from Providence on account of the conduct of the defendant. Any doubt which the jury might have had as to the defendant's guilt was removed when she admitted that Attorney John J. Murphy was assigned to defend her.

The case of larceny and receiving, preferred against B. Berkavitz, by Joseph Frankfort, was non-prosecuted, the prosecutor for the third time failing to appear.

Joseph Smith failed to appear to prosecute the charge of assault and battery he had made against James J. Sweet and he was directed to pay the costs. In this case in which John Salmon was defendant, and Langtry Shaker prosecutor, and another in which John Barrett was defendant and H. M. Seldman prosecutor, had a similar disposition.
