#### TROUBLE FOR MARK HANNA

##### Rumors of Plots on Foot for His Downfall.

##### Allen O. Meyers Announces That Hanna Will Never Be Elected to the Senate on the Close Joint Majority That Is Claimed in the Ohio Legislature—Billy Bryan Finds Consolation in the Reduction of Republican Majorities—Other Opinions.

New York, Nov. 3.—Returns from the state and city elections received today do not change the result announced last night. Returns from all the counties in the state indicate a plurality of more than 50,000 for Alton B. Parker, Democratic candidate for chief judge of the court of appeals. His plurality in Greater New York is 123,028. Van Wyck, Tammany candidate for mayor of New York, has 81,543 plurality over Low, and 118,491 over General Tracy.

#### RESULTS IN OHIO.

##### Republican Majority on Joint Ballot in Legislature.

Columbus, O., Nov. 3.—This has been a day of anxiety with the Ohio political world. It opened with the Republican and Democrats both claiming the election of their state tickets, and a majority of the members of the legislature. Before noon the Democrats conceded the election of the Republican state ticket by a plurality of 112 claims to a majority of five on joint ballot as follows: Senate, 17 Republicans, 19 Democrats; House, 58 Republicans, 20 Democrats. Total, 75 Republicans, 39 Democrats.

# MURDER ENDS A ROMANCE

### A Man Who Married His Nurse Slays His Family.

#### SHOT WIFE AND CHILD DEAD

##### Turned the Revolver on Another Child and Then Committed Suicide—The Terrible Act of an Insane Man.

Worcester, Mass., Nov. 2.—Edward Hamilton, for 25 years head accountant of the Worcester County Institution for Savings, this morning shot and killed his wife and one child and fatally wounded another child, finishing by shooting himself, with probably fatal results. Hamilton had suffered from neurasthenia and practically lived on opiates for several weeks. Mr. Hamilton was married about seven years ago to Katherine Long, a professional nurse, who had nursed him during a severe illness from pneumonia. Their married life has always been regarded as a happy one.

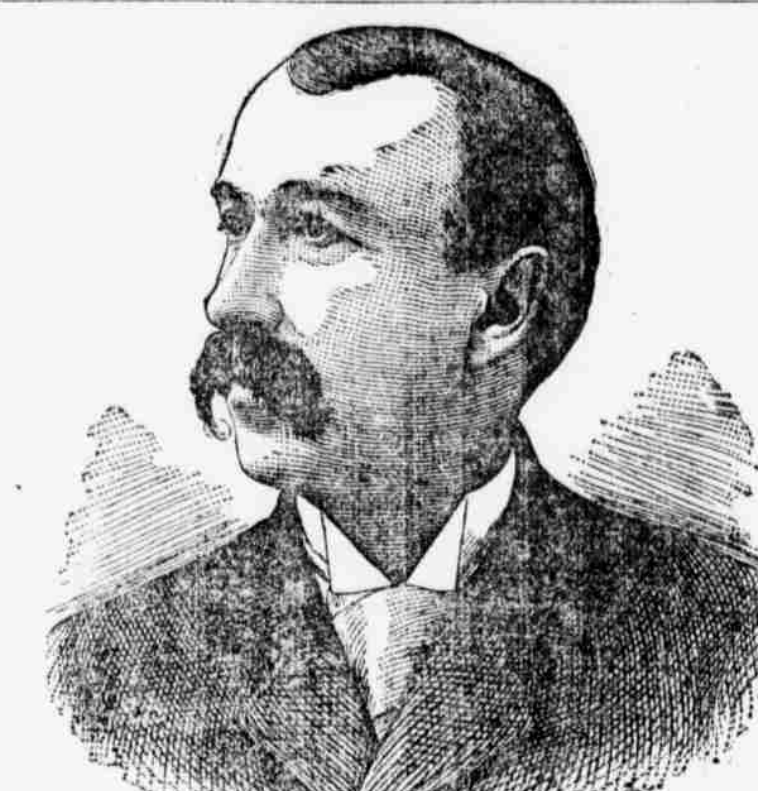
