Live Stock Sanitary Board Holds a Meeting.

Harrisburg, Nov. 5 .- A meeting of the live stock sanitary board was held this afternoon at which it was decided to station at points throughout the state inspectors to see that no cattle are admitted into Pennsylvania, Arrangements will be made with United States inspectors at different points without Pennsylvania whereby they will inspect cattle about to be shipped into the state, and in case of their being healthy will give certificates to that effect, which will carry the cattle past the state inspectors.

The board also decided to erect at the veterinary department of the University of Pennsylvania a building for experiments in the diseases of cattle.

ARMOR MATERIAL

W. Leonard Foote's Bullet-Proof Composition Resists Missiles from Winchester and Krag-Jorgensen Guns.

New York, Nov. 5.-A public exhibition was given in the Twenty-third regiment armory in Brooklyn today by W. Leonard Foote, inventor of the "bullet proof auto-dynamic armor" and was witnessed by several foreign officials and others interested in armor. A Winchester and a Krag-Jorgensen rifle were used in the test and a block of the armor about 2½ inches thick was used. A number of bullets were fired at it, but in no case did any of them go through or leave a mark of entrance. Mr. Foote previous to the exhibition stated that a similar material had been used three years ago, but since that time it had been improved. It is now perfect, according to a %inch gun shield of hard steel and does not require the same amount of care to keep it from rusting or scaling a: steel does. It is lighter than steel, weighing less than half as much.

Previous to the test of Mr. Foote's material, a Krag-Jorgensen rifle was used on a 4-inch plate. The bullet went through it, as it also did through fifty pine boards eight feet thick. In the case of the inventor's material, the bullet from the Krag-Jorgensen rifle penetrated, but after it did so the hole closed entirely, leaving an unbroken surface, the bullet remaining in the shield. The Winchester failed to penetrate. Mr. Foote after the test had been pronounced a success, stated that his invention is about 50 per cent. lighter in the ratio of resistance than steel for ships armor shields. When penetrated by bullets the puncture instantly closes, thus keeping out the water. The material is non-magnetic, according to the inventor, it is especially valuable for use on the bridges of naval vessels for shields. Count Goetzen, a military attache at Washington, and General D. Does Not Care to Discuss His Trip in the Interest of Bimetallism.

New York, Nov. 5 .- Senator Edward O. Wolcott, of Colorado, and General Charles J. Paine, two of the monetary commissioners appointed by President McKinley to confer with European governments concerning the feasibil-ity of establishing international bimetallism, arrived here tonight on the steamship Campania. The other commissioner, former Vice-President Stevenson, will return on a later vessel. Senator Wolcott asked to be excused from saying anything of his mission abroad. He was much interested in the news of the recent election, but made no comment. General Paine also declined to speak about his European trip. Senator Wolcott will remain here for a couple of days and then go

to Washington. Charles D. Lane, chairman of the national silver party, was also a passenger on the Campania. He had been to Europe on a business and pleasure tour, but not officially. Referring to the mission of the monetary commissioners, Mr. Lane said he had not expected anything better from the European governments. They were against bimetallism, but he was of the opinion that the people of this country would eventually adopt it independently of the European powers.

ROCHESTER EXCITED.

Mysterious Poisoning Case Is Puz-

zling the Authorities. Rochester, N. Y., Nov. 5.—There is considerable excitement over the mysterious death of Mrs. Eva Kunder, which occurred at her home here on Wednesday evening. An autopsy showed death was due to some irri-tant poison, which is thought by some of the family to have been placed in the coffee. All the members of the Kunder family are still suffering from the effects of the poison which caused the death of their mother.

Many think that the death of Mrs. Kunder was a murder committed by some one who had a grudge against the dead woman or some member of the family. The district attorney is irvestigating the case.
