

How long does it take a man to think? Professor Ritchet, at the recent meeting of the British association, gave the results of his investigation into this subject. He found that by mentally running up the notes of the musical scale for one or more octaves and then dividing the total by the number of notes thought of, the time taken for each note was one-eleventh of a second There are various ways of arriving at conclusions as to the amount of time necessary for realizing any physical sensation or mental impression. If the skin be touched repeatedly with light blows from a small hammer a perso may, according to Prof. Richet, distinguish the fact that the blows are sep arate and not continuous pressure when they followed one another as frequent-

ly as 1,000 a second. The smallest intervals of sound can e much better distinguished with one ear than with both. Thus the separateness of the clicks of a revolving toothed wheel was noted by one observer when they did not exceed sixty to the second. but using both ears he could not distinguish them when they occurred of-

tener than fifteen times a second. The sharp sound of the electric spark of an induction coil was distinguished with one car when the rate was as high as 500 to the second. Sight is much less keen than hearing in' distinguishing differences. If a disc half white and half black be revolvel, it will appear gray when its revolutions exceed twentyfour per second.




