Third-That the action of the commissloners complained of was not illegal, but was justified in the terms of the

Fourth-That even if the action of the commissioners had been in disregard of the programme they could not bind themselves to delegate their discretion or limit their final judgment.

Fifth-That the state being the real party in interest as defendant and its officers not being alleged to be acting in violation of the laws, which created their authority, the courts are without juris-diction of the subject matter.

In the case of Warner against Hastings the case on common pleas court of Lancaster county is affirmed in an opinion filed by Judge Mitchell,

The complainant charges that the respondents in violation of their pledges, in consideration of which his drawings were put in competition allowed his design to be photographed and published, whereby he lost the advantage of his skill and labor. This is a separate ground of complaint which could not be remedied by the injunction asked for in the bill. The disinissal of the present bill will therefore he without prejudice to complainant's rights, if an error, in such an action.
