He has an easy and graceful presence, and, being yet a young man, he has a promising future in this line. M. J. Hallinan was another entertainer who is entitled to more than passing notice. He is a dancer of better skill than many who perform professionally on the stage. The applause following his appearance was so vigorous that he had to come out again.

The programme concluded at 10.30 and another hour was spent around the festal board. Then the dancing began. Miss Nellie Curran was pianist and John Golden was promoter.
