#### COMMON PLEAS COURT.

#### Trying to Fix the Ownership of the Goods of A. W. Jurisch-Hartley-Hull Suit Still on Trial.

The ownership of the stock of A. W. Jurisch's sporting goods store in the Hotel Jermyn building was the only question introduced in common pleas esterday, Mrs. Ellen May Cokely and E. Lillian Jurisch, sisters of the storekeeper, and the Sterling Cycle company, of Chicago, the principal creditor, are the rival claimants.

In the fall of 1896, the Cycle company issued an execution against Jurisch and directed the sheriff to sell the stock of the store, Mrs. Cokely and Miss Jurisch arrested the sale, alleging that they and not their brother were the owners of the store. Court framed a suit with the Cycle company as defendant and directed the parties to maintain or relinquish their

The plaintiffs allege that the brother borrowed \$2,000 from them in 1894 when he started in business. During the summer of 1896 he came to them and saying he felt he was about to fall advised them to take steps to protect their interests. This they at once did by selling him out at con-stable's sale. They bought in the stock themselves and placed their brother in

charge as manager, The Cycle company claims that the onstable's sale was not bona fide; that it was conducted in a secret manner, and that its only purpose was to defeat the just creditors.
