ANOTHER CAR SYTEM.

Inventor Proposes to Use the Magnetic Principle on Street Traffic.

From the Boston Transcript. An electric rallway service system which the inventor believes will effectively dispense with overhead whes, underground trolleys, and consequently diminish the danger from shocks atending the present street railway methods, has been devised in St. Louis. The system seems to be similar to that with which the Westinghouse company is experimenting. The current is supplied from the power house by means of a feed-wire in the ground along the track. It is tapp-1 off this wire into 8x10x17 east-iron magnet boxes buried in the center of the track at intervals of crirty feet, more of less, as the size of the car regules. compound wound, to stand from sixtenths of an ampere to 150 amperes. This magnet acts on an armature which applies and releases the curren from the wires. Projecting from the top of the box about half an inch and level with the rail is a capper knot the size of a quarter. This the inventor terms the contact point, as it is through it the power passes into the motor of the car. The ordinary car can be used with but little alteration. Two powerful compound wound electrade magnets must be placed at eith er end, beneath the platforms or at tached to the trucks, and connecting these the traveling bar, made of thin ly-rolled corper, No other change is pro-ssary, This bar, always touching the contact points, conveys the power into the motor. When a car reaches a contact point the attraction from the car magnet passes down through the knob in the box and lifts the little armature or connecting rod within. With the rail used for connecting the negative current the circuit is thus complet d and the electricity from the feed-wire is permitted to flow out over the armature, through the little mag net, up into the motor. When the trolby has passed of the centact point the magnet in the box lets go of the armature and it drops, breaking the circuit. The little box magnet is used solely to held the armature in place while the car is passing and when the influence of the big magnet above is removed the bar drops from it, leaving the box perfectly dead. Thus there is no current exposed at any time save directly beneath the car. These boxes must be placed at such intervals as to allow the trolley to be continually in contact with one. The patent also covers a method of controlling the negative as well as positive current by means of these boxes. Two boxes are placed in the ground and one is used for carrying off the negative current instead of using the rail, as is now This prevents the electricity from damaging underground pipes,

For the location and correction of any difficulty in the buried magnetboxes fuse-boxes have been arranged These will be placed on the sidewalk and have fuse connection with all boxes on that block, or, if desirable, the next five blocks. It is claimed that the cost of placing and maintaining the new system will be fifteen per cent, less than the overhead trolley method, and that water has no effect on the boxes, thus reducing the escape of the current to a minimum.
