ANOTHER CAR SYSTEM.

Inventor Proposes to Use the Magnetic Principle on Street Traffic. From the Boston Transcript.

An electric railway service system which the inventor believes will be especially dispensed with overhead wires, underground trolleys, and consequently diminish the danger from shocks attending the present street railway methods, has been devised in St. Louis. The system seems to be similar to that with which the Westinghouse company is experimenting. The current is supplied from the trolley above by means of a feed-wire in the ground along the track. It is tapped off this wire into a coil of cast-iron magnet boxes buried in the track...

The first wedding tour across the continent was in 1858. There were two couples, Marcus Whitman, M. D., and the Rev. H. H. Hayden, and their brides. They made the journey of 3,300 miles, occupying seven months in a wagon, the first to cross the continent. Dr. Whitman, having visited the region before, was guide to the new home in Oregon. He was the first to make known its value to the United States. "South Pass" is reached, writes Mr. Wood of the famous journey. "The highest plateau, the divide of the continent. As the pass the traveler reads the inscription, 'Fremont, 1842.' All honor due to the 'Pathfinder' but also to the two heroines who had gone through six years before his claimed discovery. Let another inscription read: 'Mrs. Whitman and Mrs. Spaulding, 1858.' 'It is the month of July, the party pauses in its journey. Patriotic words are spoken at this historic spot, and flag taken from the wagon. The one is laid on a blanket spread upon the grass, the other is raised over all. The kneeling company offer prayer and praise, and reverently take possession of the region beyond in the name of God and of the United States. The only human witnesses to the scene are the two Nez Percé Indians who witnessed the Whitman wedding ceremony at Angelica, N. Y., immediately after preceding the start for Oregon."

Hermuda's Hog Money. From the Chicago News. How money in the queer name by which the brass money which was coined in Bermuda in 1855 came to be known. On the face of it was a hog; on the other side a ship of that period. The coins are very rare and prized by collectors. The history of this device is curious and interesting. A Spanish vessel, commanded by Juan Hernandez, and on its way back to Cuba with a cargo of hogs, was wrecked there. This was in 1535. Later in the same century, when the English discovered this land, they found a country inhabited by hogs. While the money was certainly not artistic or beautiful, it had the merit of individuality, being absolutely unique in the world of coins.

THE MARKETS. Wall Street Review. New York, Nov. 12.—The bears exercised no influence in today's market for securities and made no apparent attempt to do so. The bear element was in fact engaged in buying stocks to cover their contracts in the general firmness in the tone of the market administering them to protect themselves. This resulted from bear pressure and hedging on the covering of shorts, prices moved quite uniformly upward. There was no great animation to the trading but some of the buying was called of a substantial sort. The dealers continued to display strength on reports of a pending agreement to restrict the output and on the more reasonable weather that has come to prevail. New Jersey Central and Delaware and Hudson each rose 2 points at one time, but both retraced, the latter losing all of its gain. The averages also showed gains, Rock Island being especially strong. The buying of these stocks was partly an indication of a possible decision by the Supreme court on Monday in the Nebraska freight rate case. Sugar made further progress towards recovery and rose at one time to 20 cents above its close, its net gain being 1/2c. This stock again absorbed about one-third of the day's total transactions with sales of over \$3,000,000.
