TODAY'S EXERCISES.

Appropriate Thanksgiving Day Programmes Will Be Rendered in the Different School Buildings.

As usual, the several public schools of this side will be closed Thursday and Friday of this week in observance of Thanksgiving Day. This afternoon nearly all the schools will have appropriate exercises. In a few instances the school controllers will be present and many of the parents and friends of the children will attend the exercises. There are eleven schools on this side and their exercises in whole or part are given herewith.

No. 13 school, of which David Owens was recently appointed principal and which is located in the Sixth ward, a very fine programme has been prepared. Pupils from the rooms of Mr. Owen, Misses Watkins and Lewis will recite and pupils from the remaining rooms will sing songs. The Misses Lizzie Harvey, May Jones, Stella Jones, Norma and Della Kelly, Edna Parsons, Maryann Caldwell, Irene Moses, May Morgan and Salema Jones and Fred. Flyte, Ellsworth Kelly, Jay Hightield and Archie Moses will recite.

W. D. Edwards is principal of No. 17 school and it is his intention that the rooms will join in rendering exercises of an appropriate nature.

Only one room at No. 19 school, of which Miss Josie D. Laves is principal, will have any exercises. That is the intermediate B room, taught by Miss Mattie R. Fellows, and in this room a "mother's meeting" will be held. An excellent programme has been prepared. At school No. 20 short exercises will be held, consisting of songs, recitations and readings.

The teachers at school No. 11, of which Professor James R. Hughes is principal, have combined and will have general exercises for this afternoon. The programme will consist of recitations by the Misses Mollie Hoffman, Martha Hughes, Clara Haas and David Addison, Austin Fraunforter, George Transue and Harold Davis. There will be several dialogues, in which the boys and girls will take part. Besides the general singing by the school, the Misses Margaret and Annie Phillips will sing a duet and a double quartette of girls and boys will render a selection.

E. A. Crutcher is principal of school No. 16, and has arranged for a short session this afternoon in which several pupils will take part in recitations, and the school in general singing.

At No. 18, of which John T. Jones is principal, no special preparation has been made, but each room will observe the day in some manner with short exercises.

Professor P. F. Durkin, of No. 20; D. W. Phillips, of No. 31, and H. L. Moran, of No. 22, each expect to have some form of exercises by which to fittingly observe tomorrow's holiday.

LATIGABLE, YET SERIOUS.

An alarm of fire was sent in from box No. 35, corner of Jackson street and Main avenue, at 12:30 o'clock yesterday.

The cause was a laughable incident, but might easily have been of an opposite nature. A plumber was engaged in locating a leak in the gas pipes in the "American House," on North Main avenue, of which Lewis E. Jones is proprietor. He found the leak, and to see how strong the flow was, he struck a light and ignited the escaping gas. The scene that ensued is better imagined than described. What was supposed at first to be only a loose joint, became a geyser of flame and the plumber narrowly escaped a severe burning. Some person yelled "fire!" and an alarm was sent in. The Franklin and Columbus responded. Meanwhile, the flow of gas had been shut off and the danger of fire removed.

STRUCK A SPRING.
The employees of the street department who are engaged in rebuilding the sewer main on South Garfield avenue, between Washburn and Jackson streets, struck something like an artesian well or everlasting spring yesterday morning while excavating. So rapidly did the trench fill that the large hand pumps could not keep down the flow. The street department said to the fire department: "Come over to Garfield avenue with an engine and help us." Chief Hickey called out the Franklin engine and accompanied the men to the scene of action. Foreman John Kline and John Lowry, Engineer Tom Allen and Fireman William Kline manned the engine and the water was soon lowered. By keeping the engine working the men were enabled to proceed with the excavating. This will be continued until the trench has been cut deep enough and the new pipes laid, which will take a few days more.

IS COLLECTING DATA.
City Solicitor Directed to Collect From the Traction Company.

City Solicitor McKinley was yesterday engaged in collecting data with reference to the repaving of Franklin avenue several years ago. When the work was completed it was found that the Traction company thought to lay a double track, but was prevented by injunction. While the proceedings were pending the pave was laid with the company's track on one side of the street, a portion of another one being laid alongside of it.

The court eventually refused to allow the additional track and the rails had to be moved over to the centre of the street. The city of Scranton is now collecting data for repaving the street after the track was moved was \$25,130, and as the contract was with the city, the city has to pay that amount. The Traction company paid \$45 and the city council instructed Mr. McKinley to collect the balance from it.

The Traction officials say that \$45 is their full share of the paving bill and in paying it they discharged their obligation to the city.

MISS TURNER PAID SIXTY DOLLARS.
She Now Changes V. A. Beemer With False Pretenses.

Miss Tillie Turner, the postmistress and postess of Nay Aug, played a leading role in a case heard before Alderman Wright yesterday. V. A. Beemer, a Dunmore storekeeper, was defendant and the charge against him was false pretenses.

Miss Turner says she gave him a judgment note in payment for goods she obtained from him, the understanding being that an execution should not be issued on the note within a year. She said she had the note when it became due judgment for the full amount was entered by a New York firm, to whom Beemer sold the note.

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BOARD OF ASSOCIATED CHARITIES.

Regular Meeting at Which the Agents Report Was the Feature.

In the absence of Colonel Ripple, who was attending the ex-prisoners of War banquet, W. Gayford Thomas was selected to preside over last night's meeting of the Board of Associated Charities. There were present besides the chairman, Treasurer W. T. Smith, Assistant Treasurer D. J. Phillips, Secretary Rev. Rogers Israel, T. J. Kelly, and T. J. Moore. What little business was transacted was of a routine nature.

The report of the agent, Mrs. W. B. Duggan, showed that thirty cases had been investigated. Twenty-two were found worthy and assistance rendered as follows: Seven persons were furnished transportation; work was found for six; lodgings and meals were furnished six; three were sent to the Lackawanna hospital; two to the Foundling Home; three to the House of the Good Shepherd; three to the Rescue Mission; three were arrested for various crimes; clothing was furnished to seven; medical aid to three, and three cases were referred to the chief of police.
