

New York, Dec. 8.-The stock market opened this norming with a tremendous show of animation and vigorous upward tendency, gainst being uniform pretty much throughout the list. It was evident that the strength displayed by the mar-ket yesterday had brought orders to the



The stock was very feverish all day and fluctuated widely and freequently, but worked con-stantly towards a lower level and closed near the lowest at net loss of 4%. Total sales were nearly 120,000 shares. The market was kept unsettled all day. 
