WAS ALSO ACTIVE IN POLITICS

He Was Once a Member of the Chieago Bar -- Was Supreme Secretary of the A. P. A., is a 32d Degree Mason and a Member of the Mystic Shrine .- Has Just Been Sentenced

Stroudsburg, Pa., Dec. 15.-The Charles Beatty, who was yesterday sentenced by Judge Craig to fifteen months in the Eastern penitentlary for passing a forged draft on the Hide and Leather bank of New York at the East Stroudsburg National bank, was one of the best known men in the middle west. He was born in Sandusky, O., Dec. 7, 1849, and in June. 1875, graduated from the University of Michigan with the degree of A. M. For five years he was principal of the high school at Coldwater, Mich., resigning to take up the practice of law. He mive this up to become princi-pal of the Saginaw schools, which postprinciion he held until 1884. In the meantime he had become active in politics and next served as assistant prosecuting attorney of Saginax county for four years, toing a member of the sensol board and council of that city at the same time. In 1894 he moved to Chicago and became identified with the American Home Celenization comrang, and was admitted to the bar in that city. On March 27, 1896, he was admirted to practice in the United States Supreme court.

While in Michigan, Bentty became supreme secretary of the A. P. A. He is also a thirty-second degree Mason and a member of the Mystic Shrine. It is said that he began his criminal cureer while connected with the Chiand abscending to Mexico, and continued it by passing forged deafts in many of the larger cities of the south. This is his first term of imprisonment, and upon its expiration he will be taken to Florida to answer similar charges.

She was owned principally by Cap-tain Joseph Weldon, of Brooklyn, who had heretofore salled the vessel with Helgersen as chief mate. Philadelphia, Dec. 15.-While fighting a fire in the five-story brick build-ing at 1025 Market street, tonight, Foreman George Gaw, of Engine company, No. 4, was struck by a live wire and fell from the third floor landing of the fire escape to the ground sustaining injuries from which he will probably Foreman Robert Wisley, of Company No. 1, was also struck by a live wire but was not seriously injured John Connors, of Engine No. 20, was

hurt by falling bricks.

The flames gutted the fifth floor, occupied by F. W. Klinger, manufacturer of bocketbooks and fancy leathgoods, and damaged the adjoining building of William Grovemeyer, stationer, at 1027. The lower fluors of 1025, occupied by a number of firms. were damaged by water. The total loss will easily reach \$100,000, covered by insurance. Earlier in the evening the leather goods factory of Joseph A. Franks, at 213 Willow street, was damaged to the extent of about \$10,000. Harry Hines, aged 25 years, was knocked down by an engine on its way to the fire and was so badly injured that he is not expected to live. Another engine struck and badly injured Valentine Hoffner, aged 39, and Hose man John McCur, aged 26, was thrown from a hose cart and severely bruised

She is owned by Charles Nelson, and was commanded y Captain C. F. Hall.

It is supposed the steam machinery became disabled, that she was blown out of her course while under sail, The steamer went ashore at Cape Beals, on the west coast of Vancouver The purser of the ship has arrived at Nanaimo, having gone across the island.
