THE HOSPITAL.

Annual Session of the Board of Directors of the Institute.

At the annual meeting of the board of directors of the Carbondale Hospital association the following officers were elected: President, William Walker; vice president, J. G. Shophard; treasurer, James Stott; secretary, M. F. Norton.

The average number of beds occupied during the year was seventeen and twenty were in use Sept. 30. The total number of patients treated during the existence of the institution is 827.

Two hundred and thirty-one patients were treated during the year ended Oct. 31. One thousand seven hundred and twenty-two prescriptions were compounded and given.

The statistics of the individual cases are as follows: Medical, Surgical, Recovered, Improved, Unimproved, Died, Remaining.
