### THE HOSPITAL.

Annual Session of the Board of Directors of the Institute,

At the annual meeting of the board of directors of the Carbondale Hospital association the following officers were elected: President, William Walker: vice president, J. G. Shepherd; treasmer. James Stott; secretary, M. F. Norton. Four applications were received for the position of superintendent, but no action was taken by the board. M. F. Norton donated his salary of \$100 for the past year to the treasury. This gracious act was duly appreciated by the directors and the secretary received a hearty vote of thanks. The average number of beds occu-

pied during the year was sevented and twenty were in use Sept. 30. The total number of patients treated during the existence of the institution is 627. Two bundred and thirty-one patients were treated during the year ended Oct. 21. One thousand seven hundred and twenty-two prescriptions were compounded and given. The aggregate number of days patients were supported was 6,222. There were nine physiclans and surg-ons in attendance. The

average cost of each patient per week WHE \$7,46 2-10. The statistics of the individual cases are as follows:
