

SOME IMPRESSIONS OF WAR SWEPT CUBA

Condition of Pearl of the Antilles as Robert C. Adams Saw It.

MANY DYING FROM STARVATION

Mr. Adams Says the Cubans Now Turn to the United States as a Friend in Need Although All Their Lives They Have Hated and Despised Us—Thousands of the Natives Are Starving in the Cities Where They Die.

Cuba as she appeared to a Scrantonian, Robert C. Adams, who has just returned from a visit to the "Pearl of the Antilles," is not the much abused founding knocking at the door of this nation—as most Americans have been taught to believe.

Mr. Adams is secretary of the Spring Brook Water Supply company. He went to Cuba out of mere curiosity; to see the much talked about land and, incidentally, to enjoy the natural beauties of the Pearl. With him he carried no pronounced prejudice for either side of the controversy in the war.

THE TRIP TO CUBA

Mr. Adams left Scranton Nov. 1 for New York and thence to Cuba on the boat "Yournuri." The trip occupied four days. Reaching Havana, Mr. Adams engaged quarters at the "Hotel Inglaterra," which, as the name suggests, is the home of visiting English-speaking people.

"Cuba," said Mr. Adams, "is a beautiful country, climate, rich soil and all that, but—"

"What do you think of it as a nation capable of caring for itself?"

"Bah!" Mr. Adams ridiculed the idea. "You think the people incapable? Well, that's too broad a statement for me to make, but what I saw of them was anything but elevating, and as for bringing them into this country, why the proposition is absurd. Most of the people are poor, a few, a very few," emphasized Mr. Adams, "are well-to-do, but the great majority are helpless. True, the patriotic Cubans have sacrificed their all, burned their plantations and devoted their land, but it's the Cuban nature to rebel; the spirit is born in them. They're a lazy lot, whatever is good in the island has been developed by the Spaniards. The natives have done nothing."

FEELING FOR AMERICA

"As for the Cuban friendship for the United States, it is a recent feeling, sprung on us as a last resort. The United States that all their lives they have hated and despised, has become a friend in need. Because by themselves they can accomplish nothing, they ask the United States to become oblivious of the needs of our southern states, and to turn their eyes to commercial interests and help them in their effort to establish another San Domingo."

Meanwhile they go on ruining their island. They give the women and children over to be taken care of by the Spaniards. Why should the Spaniards care for the helpless any better than they do themselves? The Spanish officers sit at the cafes in Havana and smile as they drink strange tropical drinks. They are certain that the war can have but one end, and meanwhile they joke with the senorita. At the end of the beautiful Prado, where they smile and drink, the war is showing its other and nastier face. Natives whom General Weyler sent to Havana in droves to prevent betrayal of his movements are living in tents three feet high, made of scraps of bags and carpets. They have nothing to live on. The city is poverty-stricken. These helpless outcasts get thinner day by day. They look like the famine-stricken natives of India. Every morning scores of them are found dead of starvation on the streets of Havana.

DIE IN THE STREETS

"Passing along the streets you find them sleeping on sidewalks or dying as is the more general case. The tents they sleep in are foul places. Every evening the board of health wagons make a regular round of the tents, picking the past night's dead. Those are carted in wagons and buried in lots. Often they are not removed for hours and over the picturesque old city of Havana are seen the ghastly return with their awful suggestion of foulness. Meanwhile the patriotic Cubans fight for their catch-words and the Spanish officers drink strange drinks in the cafes at Havana.

of neglect. True, congress did send \$5,000, but this Consul Lee thinks is the limit of the humanity of the United States. If a family is helped today it cannot be helped again until the certain number of days have passed. Meanwhile the family die one by one of starvation and the duty of the consul is diminished just that much. If he could only spend this money freely and when it is gone ask for more, something might be accomplished.

This side of the question is not a matter of politics," said Mr. Adams. "It is a matter of humanity. The insurgents can do nothing. The Spaniards, naturally, will not do more than the insurgents, and in the meanwhile the island of Cuba reels of the dead by starvation.

WAY NEWS IS OBTAINED

In speaking of the Cuban soldiers reminded Mr. Adams of the manner in which the newspaper representatives get their news of the war. He has been in Havana. When a straggler from the inland comes into the city the reporters immediately button hole him, get a story of some bygone battle or skirmish, and a half-truthful tale is sent over the wires to the readers at home. "Frederick Longington," said Mr. Adams, "sketched his pictures of the war while comfortably settled in a hotel at Key West. No, I didn't see Karl Decker. I learned through just how he received Evangelicalism. Decker, by reputation, at least, is a noisy fellow. He furnished \$2,000 to somebody in Havana. The Spanish officers thought the girl prisoner was a burden anyway, so they consented to her rescue. Of course some sort of bluff had to be introduced, so Decker and his companions with the full knowledge of the enemy cracked a bar or two in the jail as an excuse for the story and without any interference of any kind, escorted Miss Cisneros to America and to fame.

"This explanation of the great sensation," said Mr. Adams, "was given to me by a man who was in the city at the time. It is common knowledge in Havana. I cannot give my informant's name. It may go lower by the name of the building which hasn't exploded." Mr. Adams said that in Havana the understanding was that the newspaper men were alone responsible for the bomb's presence. As for Consul General Lee, Mr. Adams answered the question by saying that Lee's opinion on the situation—"in this manner: "No one knows his opinion, at least no one in Havana. He is decidedly close-mouthed. Everybody respects him, even the Spaniards, although they look upon him as a traitor. Lee's opinion for himself the mastery of the island should be the revolution success."

THIRD SERMON OF THE SERIES.

Delivered by Rev. H. A. Grant, B. D., in Howard Place A. M. E. Church.

Rev. H. A. Grant, B. D., pastor of the Howard Place African Methodist Episcopal church, delivered Sunday evening the third sermon of the series on the subject "Inspiration and Immortality," closing as a text, Psalm xviii, 3: "As for me, I will be satisfied in the righteousness of thy hands." The speaker in part said: "Immortality is the common desire, common belief of the great mass of mankind.
